On the weekend after the RD contest, the club's communications caravan will be at the Tacking Point Lighthouse during daylight hours for the International Lighthouse and Lightship Weekend on the 20th and 21st of August. Come along and support this operation.

The special event call sign VI40BOR is expected to be well sought after so we expect a record number of contacts. Again as usual there will be a free hot dog lunch with biscuits, tea, coffee and soft drinks provided in the caravan. Normally we only take the caravan to the Lighthouse on the Saturday but if there is enough interest we will take there on the Sunday as well this year. We will make this decision at the club meeting on Saturday the 6th of August.

The Middle Brother VK2RPM 146.7 MHz two metre repeater is working well following installation of the new equipment. I-t has been necessary to activate the 91.5 Hz CTCSS to overcome the problem of interference holding the more sensitive repeater receiver open. Echo Link is available via the VK2ZCW node. The VK2RPM 2 metre repeater transmits and receives on the same dual band antenna as the co-sited 438.525 MHz UHF repeater. The UHF repeater requires a 123Hz CTCSS sub audible tone for access.

The new 438.425 MHz UHF repeater has been installed at the VK2RCN site at Telegraph Point and is working well. A 123 Hz CTCSS subaudible tone is required in order to access this repeater. The co-sited VK2RCN 147.0 MHz 2 metre repeater does not require a CTCSS subaudible tone

for access.

Finally, a gentle reminder that the club's Annual General Meeting will be held at the SES Building in Central Road, Port Macquarie immediately following a short August Monthly General Meeting at 2pm on Saturday the 6th of August 2011. The notice of this meeting appears in this month's Oxtales. All positions fall vacant at the AGM. Please consider nominating for one of the positions to help run the club. Your club needs you and your expertise! The Constitution Review Sub -committee has been working to amend the existing constitution in order to comply with the requirements of the new Associations Incorporation Act 2009. The amended constitution will be tabled for adoption by the meeting. Hence the Notice of Motion for this purpose.

Don't forget that membership subscriptions became due on the first of July 2011. You must be financial in order to vote at the AGM. 

Ham radio far from over or out

The pioneering electronic social network is experiencing a resurgence.

WHEN you think of the instant communication at our fingertips thanks to web-enabled mobile devices and the social media explosion of Twitter and Facebook, it's easy to dismiss amateur radio as a dusty relic destined for oblivion.

But the bastions of ham radio believe the century-old form of radio communication is as relevant as ever - it proved invaluable during recent natural disasters in Australia, Japan, China, Pakistan and Haiti.

One amateur radio veteran of more than 50 years, Doug McArthur (whose call-sign is VK3UM), lived through the Black Saturday bushfires, relying on his UHF CB radio to warn neighbours of the approaching flames.

When the mobile phone network was jammed and the fire had damaged landlines. locals flocked to citizen band radio.

"UHF CB was certainly a great communica-

tion tool during the fires ... we knew where the trouble spots were, which neighbours had stayed and those who had left," he says. "Since that time, about 60 locals have bought

UHF CB radios."

McArthur, 69, turned the early days of a hobby into a career in high-powered broadcasting, setting up the first radio telephone system in Alice Springs and working for the International Telecommunication Union to establish communications in the Middle East.

When Cyclone Tracy hit Darwin, he flew up to assess the damage done to phone systems. It was exactly the meltdown he had predicted, with Darwin's telephone exchange unable to withstand a "big blow".

An amateur radio operator from the Australian Capital Territories, Bob Hooper, was the first to announce to the world that Darwin had been hit.

McArthur says that even in a society of mobile phones and social media, amateur radio is a critical part of the emergency communication mix. "In a crisis, the mobile phone network will never handle the traffic that's imposed on it."

That's why many in the hobby take part in "field days", setting up a radio station in the bush using alternative power sources. But it's not all serious stuff. Radio hams like to experiment and McArthur's toy is a giant satellite dish built in the US in the 1960s and used to test the radio path across Bass Strait.

He bought it from Telstra before it could be sold for scrap metal and erected it on his Glenburn property. Not even a near-fatal stroke stopped him from attempting to reach the moon with his one-tonne dish.

"My neighbour is a welder, so we set to rebuild the frame and control system," he says. "I use it for reflecting signals off the moon, the detection of deep-space signals and astronomical noise sources, which has been a lifetime ambition for me. Only a couple of people in Australia have ever done it."

It might seem a strange pursuit, but the precision and the challenge of the moon bounce thrills this Morse-code expert.

"Of all the power that you radiate off your aerial, 98 per cent of it is lost getting to the moon and of what hits the moon, only 0.6 per cent gets reflected, with 98 per cent of that

coming back."

McArthur Skypes most nights to amateur radio friends in Sweden, the Netherlands, France and Britain but ditched Facebook after a day because he found it to be too impersonal.

Eastern and Mountain District Radio Club president Jack Bramham (VK3WWW) regards amateur radio as the original social network.

"Facebook and Twitter are about wanting to know what your friends are up to," he says. "The radio is exactly the same."

Bramham has embraced digital technology and broadcasts his Wednesday-night news program (which includes vision) on frequency 446.500 MHz via the Melbourne Amateur Radio Repeater on Mount Dandenong. In his spare time he enjoys ARDF (Amateur Radio Direction Finding), an electronic version of orienteering that's also called radiosport or fox-hunting.

"You're out in the bush with an antenna and a map and you listen for the transmitter signal, which comes on for one minute and then turns off for four minutes. You find it and check it off and move on to the next one." It might not be everyone's idea of a good time but for Bramham, hitting that elusive target while traipsing through the bush gives him a huge buzz.

"There's a lot of skill involved, especially on VHF and UHF, because you get a lot of reflections. You might think it's in that direction but it's bouncing off a hill over there.'

When Australian astronaut Andy Thomas was on a mission to the Russian Mir space station in 1998, Bramham managed to arrange a time to speak with him during a 10-minute window of opportunity when the space shuttle was just 400 kilometres away

from Melbourne.

"I asked if he could talk to our radio club and because it was May Day, he had been given the day off," Bramham says. "We had 70 or 80 people in here listening. A lot of the guys will never forget that night."

Wireless Institute of Australia spokesman Jim Linton (VK3PC) says one of the biggest things to happen to amateur radio is the removal of Morse code as a minimum requirement for an operator to obtain a licence.

The foundation licence is now simple enough for young children to acquire.

About 20,000 Australians have amateur radio licences, with increasing interest being shown by younger people and women.

"There was virtually no one interested before the arrival of the newest entry level," Linton says. "Now we have more activity on air, increased numbers being assessed and a higher level of club membership."

With the higher standard and advanced licences, people can operate on more bands and modes, including digital transmissions online.

Using radios at both ends and the internet as the conduit, it is cheap and easy to make international calls known as IRLP (Internet Radio Linking Project).

Maths teacher Edward Seeto (VK3LIP) of the Sherbrooke Community School, which has its own radio club, demonstrates on a hand-held radio, typing in a code on a keypad and accessing a web-enabled local repeater to connect to a user in Dallas, Texas.

"Radio continues to exist because it's integrated the new digital technology, and convergent technology is how it will survive," Seeto says.

From an outdoor radio gazebo with its 15-

metre-high Nally radio tower, a dozen of his students are learning the ropes from ham radio veterans Randall McDonald (VK3RM) and Jim McNabb (VK3AMN), who volunteer their time on Thursdays and on weekends.

Grade 8 student Monique Golub achieved her foundation licence in grade 6 and now competes in amateur radio challenges such as the 160-metres Trans-Tasman contest, with points scored for contacts made over a sixhour period.

"I just love the people you meet and the competitions," the 13-year-old says. "I've spoken to a chef in Texas and an astronaut on the International Space Station. "I was the first girl in the club and now some of my friends have joined."

Seeto says students have learnt to be resourceful and experimental through building their own equipment, and it has given them a practical understanding of mathematical equations such as Ohm's law. "They're not passive consumers," he says.

"They make things like their own antennae from cast-offs. There's quite some maths and dexterity involved. [Amateur radio] is encouraging them to pursue maths and sciences, and providing social interaction."

As a relative newcomer in the past five years, Richard Holmes (VK3TXD) is keen to dispel the amateur radio stereotype of old blokes tinkering in beeping sheds.

"I think we have to demystify amateur radio," he says.

"You don't have to be a propeller-head to be in it. There are a whole range of personalities that do this, including a few bombastic fools - we've got it all."

He hopes a new generation of young amateur radio operators will find clever ways to

evolve the hobby and embrace its global connections.

For Holmes, the mystery of contact has always been the real lure.

"Amateur radio is a bit like fishing - you never know who's going to come back," he says. "You twiddle around on the bands and you can hear the world come in."

Amateur radio jargon:

Ham - an amateur radio operator.

HF - High frequency range, between 300 kHz and 30 MHz.

VHF - Very high frequency, between 30 MHz and 300 MHz.

UHF - Ultra high frequency range, between 300 MHz and 3 GHz.

VK - prefix for Australian amateur call signs. Foundation licence - the entry-point amateur radio licence in Australia.

Rag chewing - talking for longer than 30 minutes.

Homebrew - building your own equipment.

DXing - tuning in to a distant radio signal.

Porcupine - a car with several antennas on it.

Sandbagging - listening, not talking.

Sched - to schedule a time to talk.

Dogpile/logjam - people all trying to talk at once.

Change default calendar starting week-day in Windows XP

In the "Date and Time Properties" dialog of Windows XP (reachable by double-clicking on the time/date on the taskbar) the week in the calendar starts on Monday. I would like to change it so that it starts on Sunday. How can this be done?

It's region specific. I have Windows XP set up with English (Australian) regional settings; that automatically changes the first day of the week to Monday, but you can't change only that setting by yourself.

However, there is a registry setting that can change this, but you can take a look there and see (though I strongly recommend not mucking about with the registry unless you really know what you're doing):

Procedure:

Do a System Backup BEFORE you change the Registry, that way if you mess the change up; a System Restore can be done to undo the damage!


With your mouse select *START*, then *Run*, then in the Open window type *regedit*, then click *OK*, this will open the Registry.

The value is stored in the registry at *HKEY_CURRENT_USER\Control Pan-el\International*.


With that key selected you will see *iFirst-DayOfWeek* entry in the right pane.

Click on *iFirstDayOfWeek*, a new window will appear, called "*Edit String*", change the "*Value data*" from 0 to 6. Then *exit*.

If you have the Calendar open close it and then reopen it, and now you will see that the week now starts with Sunday! Before Registry change:

Radios from yester year AR8

John VK2AYQ

In my recent travels I came across an AR8 in the Bega Historical Museum as part of their World War Two exhibits. Thanks is given to the museum for allowing the photography of the items.

The AR8 receiver was built by AWA at Ashfield, Sydney, Australia during WW2. They were part of the AR8/AT5 aircraft MF/HF system.

The receivers were unique in design, having two front ends (MF and HF) which were switched into a common IF Channel of 755kc (KHz). This feature enabled two frequencies to be rapidly selected. For example, the MF tuner could be tuned to a broadcast station

for DF purposes while the HF unit was set to a communication channel. The sets were supplied with loop antennas for direction finding on the MF bands. The audio amplifier in the receiver was also utilized as an intercom amplifier that could drive five pairs of service headphones in parallel.

Reception modes were:

MF: CW, MCW, RT, Aural DF and Sense

HF: CW,MCW and R/T

Sensitivity: 6mw audio output-

Below 9.5 Mc (MHz) Not more than 3uv in-

Above 9.5 Mc (MHz) Not more than 10 uv input

Power Requirements:

The station could be configured for 12 or 24v operation. HT was supplied by a dynamotor during aircraft or portable operation, supplying 250vdc for the receiver. A mains supply, Type 'S", to run the complete station was also available. It was very heavy!



On my travels I am always on the look out for interesting stories about old radios and electrical equipment. When visiting the Bega Cheese Factory and Heritage Centre (well worth the visit) at Bega I found the following radio set.

John VK2AYQ

1937 Weldon Wireless



Built by the Weldon Radio and Finance Co. 4 Martin Place Sydney.

This wireless was used by Gus and Vera Heffernan and children, Frank, Vin and Des at the Buckajo Farm, Bega. When the electricity was connected in 1950 to the new dairy and house it was 'pensioned' off to the dairy. Long distance stations could be received especially at night (except during storm activity).

Radio 2BE operating on 1,480 Kc (KHz) was the only local station at the time and was owned by Mr John Kerr during the 1940's and a Mr Bill Jardine was the local news-reader.

Donated to the Bega Cheese Factory and Heritage Centre by Brother, Frank, Vin and Des Heffernan.


