quarie area. Stations that were experiencing extremely weak signals are now able to access the digipeater direct.

The "backbone" UHF link southwards to VK2RGL-4 is still inoperative, but tests conducted on Sunday 8th October resulted in reliable indications that VK2RGL-4 is slightly off frequency. GLRC members are following this up and it is hoped that the link will soon be restored.

### Membership Subscriptions

Whilst there has been an encouraging payment rate of membership subscriptions this financial year, there is still quite a number of usually prompt "payers" who have not yet come to the party. The club needs your financial support in order to meet its obligatory expenditure. If you intend continuing your membership, your payment would be appreciated as soon as possible.

### Repeater Status Report

At the time of going to press, the status of all the club sponsored repeaters was "Operational". Members will be aware that we suffered a period of "Downtime" at the Middle Brother site, a few weeks back. This was the result of an accidental disconnection of the AC supply to our cabinet, by contractors working on the site. The disconnection was believed to have occurred on a Wednesday, but our repeaters struggled on for a few more days, finally going off air when the batteries went flat some time over the following weekend.

We received prompt action by the responsible authorities when we established and reported the loss of the AC supply. They attended in less than 24 hours of our advice, and made a temporary restoration pending a permanent fix that took place two days later.

Sadly, the battery associated with the 70cm repeater suffered such deep trauma that it failed to recover after a period of recharging. This battery will be replaced. The remaining bank that looks after all other repeaters on the site is recovering well, and is expected to continue working as though nothing had happened.

The repositioning of the local digipeater's VHF Port antenna has improved the coverage in the Port Mac-

### The Beechwood Billycart Classic

The year 2000 Beechwood Billycart Classic (previously known as the Beechwood Billycart Derby) was held on Sunday 15th October. The weather was generally kind (just a few gusty breezes at times) and a good crowd, of several hundred, witnessed the event.

The main event, involving adult participants, was supported by four shorter events for the school age participants. This year, there were also added attractions in the form of market stalls in the Beechwood CBD, a Pie Eating Contest, Chain-saw racing, Harley Rides, and Line Dancing displays. The day is well recognised as a family event and is recommended as an enjoyable day out in a picturesque spot in the Hastings Valley.

Once again, the ORARC Inc., members provided their time and equipment to satisfy communications requirements, and the facilities for a live mobile commentary to be delivered over the Public Address system at the finishing line.

There was no Fun-Run this year, which meant that significantly less club resources were required to meet the organiser's needs.

Club members Roy (VK2YOR), David (VK2AIF), Charles (VK2FSH) and Trevor (VK2TT) set up the equipment. Roy again won the hot-seat in the commentary vehicle, risking life and limb as it charged down the mountain endeavouring to keep ahead of the gravity powered contestants. The rest of the crew looked after the base station requirements in the relative safety of the area around the finishing line.

There were no mishaps, no communications



glitches or equipment failures, and it is understood that the organisers were completely satisfied with the coverage that our club provided. We gained prominent public mention in the credits in the formal part of the proceedings.

The proceeds from this yearly event are always directed to a worthy charity and this year the Hastings Diabetes Association were the beneficiaries. It was with pleasure that the ORARC Inc., was able, once again, to assist by providing our time and facilities at no charge to the organisers of this popular community event. Thanks to the club members who gave their support.

### CW Morse Code

### International Lighthouse/Lightship Weekend 19/20th August

Our attention was drawn to the IL/L Weekend by a news item from Mike Dalrymple GM4SUC via Kevin VK2CE and it was decided at the August general meeting that the club would participate. Bob VK2EJK was appointed co-ordinator and there were plenty of offers to participate.

The opportunity to obtain some publicity for the activity was taken up with a news release to the local radio, TV, and the Port Macquarie News. PM News ran an informative column on the Friday prior to the event which was appreciated. Both GM4SUC and VK2CE were both advised of VK2BOR's intention of operating from Tacking Point Lighthouse.

For those interested in lighthouses, Tacking Point Lighthouse is situated at Latitude 31deg 28.7 mm S., longitude 152 deg 56.2 E and is distinguished by group flashing 4 every 20 seconds with an intensity of 28,000 cd. The elevation of 34 metres has a range of 16 nautical miles. The history of the lighthouse can be viewed at:

A gathering of the technical staff was held at Bill's VK2ZCV home on the Saturday prior to the event to discuss the equipment requirements and the transport of same. Final arrangements were made on the Friday night at the club room meeting.

At 8.30 am Saturday the transport crews ar-

rived at the lighthouse, and together with other willing workers, the equipment was manhandled up the hill. A tent kindly loaned by the Apex Club was erected first and next the antennas, a six element Yagi for 2 metres and a G5RV inverted "V" for HF. At this stage we were confident that the weather would be 5.9 plus, so the 2.4KVA generator was left at the base of the hill with 30 metre cable run. The other heavy piece (but most necessary), the barby, was taken up the hill and set up along the lee side of the lighthouse. (we did not want any vessels distracted)

Bill VK2ZCV and Neil VK2EI were soon underway on 2-metre SB with the IC-706 and a 200 watt amplifier, whilst in the other corner Bruce VK2HOT and Arthur VK2ATM fired up the IC.738 For HF work. Other operators to join the team were Bob VK2EJK Ian VK2XU and David VK2AYD. Craig VK2HBM was in regular attendance, gathering valuable experience.

The morning went well with regular contacts on VHF and HF but complacency was shattered when it was reported that the empty gas bottle was out of date. Fortunately a committee quorum was present and President Charles VK2FSH was dispatched to purchase a new bottle, (a strike had been adverted) and the barbecue lunch went down well, thanks to Charles and John VK2KHB.

David was confident that even penguins can read Morse, so he gave Antarctica a try and was copied by R1ANZ, a member of the Russian team in Antarctica. He also had a CW contact with VE7SV. At the end of the day twenty contacts had been made on 20 and 15 metres and were mostly lighthouses including LY1FW in Lithuania.

The 2 metre team collected eleven contacts, including AX2000 at Crowdy Head lighthouse. One other call was VK2MP at Murrumbateman. It is a town midway between Yass and the ACT border and you can not miss it, it's the only one on that road.

All good things have to come to an end and as the sun set in the west, the equipment was dismantled and stowed back into the vans ready for a repeat on Sunday.

Sunday arrived with rather poor conditions and at 9:30am, with drizzling rain, those who had turned up decided that it was not a good idea to get the borrowed tent wet, so the convoy returned to the club room and stowed the gear ready for the next event. The team enjoyed the exercise, the site was first class and we are looking forward to the next one,



which could be the John Moyle.

Thanks to the team and all those members who came and gave support.

### Packet Radio Activity

Things in the packet radio scene have not brightened up over the past 12 months. In fact, within the Port Macquarie/Hastings region, there are currently only 3 stations (which includes the BBS) that are regularly on air. There are two or three "Prairie Dog" style stations (those that pop up for a brief appearance, then dive back into their burrows after ten minutes or so) that augment the overall count from time to time, but that is about as far as it goes.

Arthur (VK2ATM), upon his recent retirement, closed down the BBS that he operated on behalf of the club for many years, but it was reactivated by John (VK2VY) as soon as he got up to speed on the software and hardware that Arthur handed over. So there is no valid excuse for the apparent drastic fall-off in packet interest.

The BBS is now operative, with a User-Port on 144.875MHz under call sign VK2VY-1. The club operates a digipeater, also on 144.875MHz, which allows access to that portion of the ROSE network that is currently operational.

Members who are not familiar with packet working would be justified in asking "What the heck is a ROSE network?" And believe it or not, the ROSE network about which I am talking, has nothing to do with a heap of lovely perfumed flowers that carry thorns on their stems and known to co-habit with Shamrocks and Thistles. The letters ROSE, in our packet case, just form a fashionable acronym, but they are taken from the words RATS Open System Environment. The RATS bit is yet another acronym taken from the initial letters of Radio Amateur Telecommunications Society, an organisation in the USA that initially placed ROSE on the freewill offering platter of amateur radio.

ROSE therefore deserves a basic introduction to our local scene in the hope that it might ginger-up some enthusiasm amongst adventurous members and encourage them to give the club's packet facilities at least a try out.

But first a brief introduction to packet radio. Very broadly speaking, packet is a digital mode of commu-

nication. CW is fundamentally a digital mode of communication, but it needs a substantial bit of acquired expertise on the part of humans for it to be used in a practical manner. Packet needs a computer and a bit of relatively inexpensive hardware at each end, with only minimal expertise on the part of the inevitable human participants.

Don't be scared of computers... they are proliferating in a large percentage of our homes these days, doing both great service and great disservice to the occupants, but are controllable by humans of all shapes, sizes, genders, political persuasions, and age-groups. Like the humble Phonocard, they can be abused, but in the hands of credible citizens they can be a marvellous tool *and* they will get you on packet!

Never before have they (computers) been so inexpensive and easy to acquire. Obsolete models are available at give-away prices, but obsolescence is of little consequence as far as their use as experimental devices in the amateur radio shack is concerned.

It is assumed that most amateurs already have either an HF transceiver, or a VHF transceiver operational in their shack. Add the computer that you may already have (or may easily acquire) and the only item outstanding is either a simple home-brew modem for the economically minded, or a Terminal Node Controller (TNC in the trade) for those with a hundred or so discretionary dollars at their disposal. That is all you need, apart from some readily available software that is either a "freebie" in some cases, or for the purist, some Shareware, or even commercial packages that cost you.

So, assuming I have sucked you in to giving the foregoing a bit of a whirl, the next thing you might ask is "What is ROSE going to do for me".

Well, from our club member's viewpoint, ROSE lives up on Middle Brother (and on other mountain tops and tall buildings) inside a couple of TNC's that do all the work for you, and she operates through VK2RPM on 144.875MHz. She can be likened to an intelligent switching system, which, when given the correct (yet simple) instructions by you (through your gear described above) will enable you to make contact with a distant compatible packet station of your choice. The distant station can be anywhere that is served by, or linkable to, another ROSE switch, and you do not have to worry about where that switch is, or the route

that needs to be traversed to make the connection. All you need to know is the call sign of the distant station, and a six digit ROSE Code that identifies the switch that services the station with whom you seek to communicate.

The simplicity of the keyboard strokes that you would need to make to bring about a connection with a friend in Sydney (assuming that you are in the Hastings, Taree, or Forster area) is demonstrated by the following:

C VK2RX via VK2RPM,294770

Such a command would connect you to station VR2RX in Riverwood who is served by a ROSE switch near Hornsby that is identified by the 294770 code above.

Be aware that ROSE switches are maintained by a bunch of worthy volunteers, and it is not unknown for them to develop faults that can put them off air for periods that are sometimes lengthy.

Packet is not confined to simple contacts and conversations via the keyboards of your computers. There are many other useful applications that are allied to amateur radio activities, and computer technology.

If there is any interest stirred up by this little item, I will endeavour to more fully outline packet's attributes, uses, (and frustrations!) in later OXTALES. In the meantime, just give it a thought as a possible future activity if you get bored with resurrecting CW.... Hi.

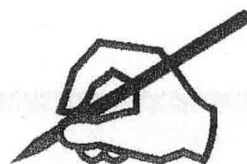
### JOTA/JOTI Preparations.
