More From VK2BUE (Ernie)

Members will recall the interesting two-part series covering the life story of Ernie (VK2BUE) that we read in recent issues of Oxtales. Well, Ernie has now given us some details of his association with the Fairy Swordfish, an aircraft with which he became very familiar during WW2. Here, again in Ernie's own words, is his account of this association. (Thanks again Ernie, for another original contribution from a distant member... Ed)

The first time I saw a Fairy Swordfish was in 1936. Our squadron of Fairy 3F's was being replaced with them

It was larger than the 3F. Its engine was a Bristol Pegasus 775HP, whereas the 3F had a Rolls Royce End Line Type which had a habit of "Big end" failures. Not so with the Pegasus which proved to be a very reliable motor.

We thought it was a very nice looking aircraft. My pilot, a Flying Officer (Royal Air Force) took off from the glorious carrier. He dived it, side slipped it, looped it and then took it up to 21,000 feet and did a power dive and it performed beautifully. He said to me "I can fly it using the ailerons on top of the wing." To tell the story of the Swordfish, the damage this old bi-plane did in WW2 is worth recording.

I guess you all know how the Swordfish attacked the German Battleship "BISMARCK" and put her steering gear out of order so the navy could trap and sink her. But that's not all! During WW2, our convoys were being decimated by U-boats and the situation was pretty grim.

I don't know who suggested the idea to Winston Churchill, but someone pointed out that those fast freighters that brought fruit over from the West Indies—nick-named Banana Boats—could be stripped and the upper deck replaced with a flight deck. In other words, make them into small aircraft carriers.

But what aircraft was slow enough to land on them. Why! What else but the Swordfish.

So each convoy had four carriers. Each carrier had 4 Swordfish planes which were fitted with 4 depth charges each. A potential of sixty four "Ash Cans".

I guess you all know about the Brits breaking the Enigma Code. So it was known where and when the U-boats would attack. To do this they have to be at periscope depth and are perfectly visible from the air. They didn't know what hit them. Pack after pack got blitzed in this way and the convoys kept getting to their destinations.

The last operation by the Swordfish of 825 Squadron is accounted in the enclosed copy of TAGS, the Journal of The Telegraphist Air Gunners Association. The story, by Roy Gibbs, MID, of Orpington, Kent, is included below:

This is the story of the glorious, if ill fated and ill conceived, but famous Channel attack against the Scharnhorst and Gneisnau, two of Germany's most powerful ships. The information has been researched from Ray Sturtivant's book, British Naval Aviation, and other sources.

After the sinking of the Bismark, the remnants of 825 Squadron, in January 1942, were reforming at Lee on Solent. Fears that the Scharnhorst and Gneisnau would break out, led the squadron moving on the morning of the 4th February, 1942 to RAF Station, Manston. Here they were put on 5 minutes readiness for what was expected to be a night attack.

On the morning of 11th February, the German ships took advantage of the poor weather to move out, heavily protected by a destroyer screen and a large fighter aircraft umbrella. By the time Lt. Cmdr. Esmonde, 825's CO, received orders to mount an attack the next morning, they were well up the English Channel. 825 had been promised fighter cover from 411, 64 and 72 RAF squadrons but only 10 fighters from 72 squadron turned up and there were soon heavily engaged in a dog fight with the huge number of FW 190's and



ME 109's to be of much use to the Swordfish.

Esmonde led the first sub flight of three into the attack and although his port wing had been shot to ribbons, somehow, made it over the Destroyer and E Boat screen and released his torpedo, after which he was shot down by a FW 190. His TAG, Bill Clinton, was reported by a Spitfire pilot as last seen on the back of the fuselage trying to beat out the flames in the tailplane. The second Swordfish was piloted by

The second Swordfish was piloted by Sub. Lt. Rose, whose TAG, Ambrose Johnson had already been killed. Rose himself had already been wounded in the back and moments later a shell splinter fractured his petrol tank. With

engine faltering he aimed his torpedo at the Gneisnau and saw it running well at 2000 yards. The Observer, Sub. Lt. Lee was unhurt and tried to take over the TAG's gun, but couldn't move Johnson's body. They crashed into the sea. Lee managed to get Rose out and into the dinghy but Johnson was too firmly wedged in the cockpit and sank with the Swordfish.

Sub. Lt. Colin Kingsmill who was piloting the third Swordfish had early in the action been hit in the engine and had the upper port wing on fire. In spite of this the TAG, Don Bunce kept firing and shot down an enemy fighter. After dropping their torpedo at about 3000 yards, they were also shot down. Luckily they were picked up by a British MTB within 10 minutes, as their



dinghy had been destroyed by fire.

The second sub flight of 3 Swordfish were last seen taking evasion action as it flew into an inferno of anti aircraft fire. There were no survivors to tell the tale.

Esmonde was awarded a posthumous Victoria Cross, the 4 surviving officers the DSO and Don Bunce the Conspicuous Gallantry Medal. All the other members of this gallant force who lost their lives were awarded a Mention in Despatches. Admiral Ramsey, Flag Officer Commanding Dover, wrote "In my opinion, the gallant sortie of these six Swordfish constitutes one of the finest exhibitions of self sacrifice and devotion to duty that the war has

vet witnessed."

It is these chaps we will be commemorating when we lay our wreath on the 14thg March at the FAA Memorial on the Embankment and after at the Stag Lunch.

There has been some criticism of the fact that those who lost their lives only got a MID. However, I have been told that this is the only award given posthumously, other than a V.C.



VK contacts but as the afternoon progressed the temperature became colder but


the calls improved. At 4.36 pm the generator fuel tank was low and hypothermia was taking over so it was called a day. Gear was packed up and returned to the clubroom.


Simple Field Strength Meter

did a "show-and-tell" on the simple field
strength meter shown here. With the exception of the 50 uA meter, the components are likely to be available in the junk
box or around the shack. Construction of
the whole project takes in the order of
around 2 hours. It is a handy addition to
the shack if you don't already have a
similar little device for detecting the presence of RF, and doing relative measurements on your RF generating devices and
antennae.
