President's Report

Our Editor had chosen to feature "Snow" Hodder, VK2DV as our "Personality of the Month" in this issue and had taken the opportunity to interview "Snow" just after he had come out of hospital recently. Little did he know at that point



it would prove so timely as "Snow" passed away on Saturday morning, 30th August, following a fairly rapid decline in health. Sadly, "Snow" won't get to see his profile in print but it gives us something special to remember him by.

As reported elsewhere in this issue, we were also able to present him with his life membership badge and certificate a couple of weeks ago, a visit I'm sure he appreciated. We will miss him.

Activities this month included the Lighthouse "do" at Tacking Point which proved to be a very enjoyable day for all concerned and another occasion to flex our muscles and see how fast we could get the tent up and the gear operational. We get better every time! Thank you to all who attended and contributed in so many ways.

Friday evening attendances have been up this month with some good discussion taking place on a wide range of topics. Surprising the activities our members have been involved in over the years – some perhaps best left unspoken! We have also taken the opportunity to check out some of the equipment the Club has recently acquired, including two UHF link transmitter/receivers previously owned by Country Energy. This gear is readily adaptable to 70cm and, apart from some minor repairs, only requires some new crystals on a frequency

of our choice. A suggested use is to provide a link between our two repeaters at Red Hill and Middle Brother once the former is back in service. We need to continue this equipment culling process as there is little sense in storing gear for which we have no use, either now or in the foreseeable future.

There is no further update on Rhema's intended move to Red Hill as they are still waiting ABA approval for the shift. Incidentally, their transmitter power is only 3kW ERP, not 10kW as previously reported. The transmitter runs 600W.

By now most members will have received the ACA letter regarding the proposed Review of Amateur Service Regulations, details of which are available on the ACA website. I suggest we check out the document then discuss the contents at a Friday Club meeting if it is felt necessary.

Congratulations and thanks to those officers who were elected for a further term, and welcome and congratulations/thanks to Henry for accepting the Secretaryship.


Also, thanks to Bill, VKZCW, for taking on the role of Chairperson of the Repeater Committee, following the stepping down of Trevor, VK2TT.

"Snow" Hodder VK2DV

Frederick Alexander ("Snow") Hodder is the ORARC's most senior member, i.e. he has completed more orbits around Old Sol than any other current member of our club. What's more, "Snow" had Life Membership conferred upon him at our July 2003 meeting. ORARC's tradition has been to reward members who achieve 85 years of age, with the Life Membership status. Congratulations "Snow", and welcome to the ranks of those who hold that prestigious honour.

OXTALES persuaded "Snow" to undergo a session of interrogation in order to get down on the club records some hard copy on the background to a fellow who has devoted around seventy years of interest and activity in communications in general, and Ham radio in particular. "Snow" had only emerged from hospital a few days prior to his interrogation (he had done himself a mischief in a fall, resulting in a painful fracture) but he faced up to the "ordeal" of questions and answers in fine style.



"Snow's" interest in communications technology has been with him from day one. He can't recall when it actually started, because it was with him from the beginnings of his arrival on this planet. That was way back in May of 1917!

Born at Edgecliff NSW, "Snow" spent most of his growing-up years in that area of suburban Sydney. He did his schooling there, and joined a well established and well equipped amateur radio club, The Waverley Radio Club, that met in Bronte Road in the early 1930's.

Supportive parents encouraged his interest in technology, providing him with accommodation for his first "ham shack" at the rear of the family home at Woollarah, and at times some financial assistance in obtaining radio components.

"Snow" studied electrical and radio theory off his own bat. He relied on publications such as The ARRL Handbook, and other technological books of the era, as the sources of information that he needed for passing the A.O.C.P.

Knowledge of Morse Telegraphy was first gained as a member of the Boy Scouts, and along with some tutorial help from fellow club members, he gained his AOCP in 1935. His first call sign was VK2DV! He holds it to this day, maintaining its currency for 68 years. Six years ago, "Snow" received a "long service" award from the WIA, having clocked up 62 years continuous membership in the organization.

Like all amateurs who entered the hobby in those early years of radio communication, "Snow" built and refined his own transmitting and receiving equipment. Commercial gear was not really in general production in that era, and, as a consequence, was scarce and prohibitively expensive for a lad.

His first station comprised a "Home Brewed" T.R.F receiver, and a M.O.P. A. Transmitter. Of course, its capability was "CW only". It was a condition of one's licence in that period, that for the first year of operating, one was confined to "CW only" before being authorised to venture on to the other modes of operation. This gear was later "upgraded" to accommodate voice communication (AM of course... SSB was only being thought about, and superficially tinkered with on drawing boards and the like.)

The big depression was in full swing when "Snow" left school, and full time permanent jobs, in his particular field of interest, were not easy to come by. However, over the next few years, he managed to get casual positions as a "Wireless Mechanic" with some of the well known manufacturers of domestic radio sets, thus getting an income and valuable experience in the field.

He began this career wiring up radios, graduated through to testing, and eventually gained proficiency on maintenance and repair of the manufactured products. He worked in organizations such as Stromberg-Carlson, Tasma, Weldon, Philips, Kriesler, STC, and others of that era.

But, there was a degree of uncertainty on job tenure, due to the depression. In 1937, dissatisfaction with the uncertainty of permanent employment, led to "Snow's" decision to join the R.A.A.F. as a career. Because of his experience, and proficiency, in practical radio, and his Amateur Radio operating skills in telegraphy, he had no trouble in gaining selection for the Royal Australian Air Force, in the communications sphere.

In 1938, "Snow", now living in Double Bay, added an extension to his Amateur Licence, and gained approval to operate an experimental broadcast station. His station operated on a frequency of 1240KHz. His chosen experimental time slot was from Midnight on Fridays until dawn on Saturdays. During this period each week, he would broadcast music from his recording collection. "Snow" still has in his possession the actual crystal that he used in this station.

Amateur activity was curtailed during the war period. All amateur gear was sealed up in boxes by the authorities for the duration of the war, for reasons relating to National Security, but call signs were retained over that period.

"Snow" served throughout WWII, in the RAAF, progressing through all ranks from Aircraftsman to Acting Squadron Leader.

Portion of his service was involved in training air-crew recruits for active service in wireless operating as part of the Empire Air-Training Scheme.

He then served in the Darwin area (Batchelor) and was later shipped (without pre-embarkation leave) to the New Guinea area, (Merauke) where he served as signals officer for over a year. In the later years of the war he was involved in dismantling Radar Installations as the Squadron Leader in charge.

He departed from the service at the end of the war and prepared himself for a career in civvy street, but still in the communications sphere.

Having a wish to embark on a sea-going career "Snow" undertook study at the Marconi School of Wireless to gain his First Class Commercial Operator's Certificate of proficiency, and his Broadcast Station Operator's Certificate of Proficiency.

These qualifications also equipped him for, and gained him a position with A.W. A. He became a Ground Engineer (Aviation) Radio, stationed mainly at Mascot over the next ten years, involved in installation and maintenance on air-borne equipment, from AWA and Bendix.

More promising opportunities then beckoned him into the Government sector, and he departed from AWA for a position with the Department of Supply (Department of Defence). This took him to interesting places and activities working on defence projects, notably the IKARA Anti-Submarine system and anti-tank devices that were developed in the Woomera area.

"Snow" retired in the late 70's, but retained his association with communications by continuing his activities in Amateur Radio, having now much more time to spend with it.

He moved to Port Macquarie, taking up residence in Pacific Drive, where he set up his station complete with tower, 3-element beam, and long wire antennae.

He became a member of ORARC in the late 1970's and has maintained continuity of membership throughout. Later "Snow"

moved to Treeview Way where he again set up a tower, 3-element beam, and long wire.

A year or so ago, he now moved to Woods Street in the Hibbard area of Port Macquarie. Still regularly active, "Snow" enjoys his favourite mode, CW, but claims that he needs to use a "bug" key to "beat the shakes" that have crept up on him in later years. Like many retired members of the amateur fraternity, "Snow" makes use of the airwaves to keep in touch with old friends and colleagues by maintaining regular schedules on both CW and SSB. "Snow" is a regular attendee on the ORARC's VHF net on Sundays at 0830 local time.

We all wish "Snow" a speedy recovery from his recent injuries.

Saturday 16th August was Lighthouse Day
and 8.30am saw a group of vehicles being
loaded with equipment at our club room.
The convoy proceeded to Tacking Point
Lighthouse where it was greeted by a
group of willing workers who were ready
to put the gear into position.

The set-up of the tent, antenna and generator were completed and the transmitter was on air at 10.00am. Setting up of a portable emergency communication unit without any hitches is certainly a credit to those regular hands. We have learnt from previous experiences such as empty gas bottles, lack of generator tools and antenna tuners, etc..

Radio operator skills were on the ball but the catering corps have raised the standard of the project to first class. Bill, VK2ZCV, and Elfie's rissoles, complete with microwave oven, (that fixed the gas problem hi) has lifted the event's rating considerably as stated by our food connoisseurs, Keith, VK2KDL and Gwen.

At the completion of the day 33 contacts, consisting of 15 CW and 18 SSB were made and included the countries of New Zealand, Yugoslavia, Russia, Spain, Finland, Canada, Lithuania, Poland, Sweden, Bulgaria, Romania, Czech Republic and Australia. This was a good result since propagation was not the best during the time of operation. The equipment used in this event was an Icom transceiver, a Hi Gain antenna and the power was supplied by a 2.4 KVA alternator.

Packing up was without problems, leaving the area ready for a wedding party who had another application for Tacking Point Lighthouse. The convoy had the equipment back to the storeroom all in one piece and stacked away to the equipment officer's satisfaction.

Thanks to the 14 members who participated, the Oxley Region Amateur Radio Club was presented to the public and members have also gained further experience in emergency operation.
