



VALE "Snow" VK2DV

The September issue of *OXTALES* carried a profile of "Snow's" life in communications and the amateur radio hobby. At the time "Snow" was interviewed to recount the interesting details of his lifetime in communications, he was recovering from some injuries sustained in a couple of recent accidental "falls". We were unaware at that time that, quite soon thereafter, we would lose our long-standing and respected member of the local and far reaching amateur fraternity. "Snow's" health went into a fairly rapid decline shortly after the interview, and sadly, he lost the battle, passing away on Saturday 30th August, 2003.

The story of "Snow's" interesting life of achievement and service to his country was featured in the September 2003 issue of Oxtales and the October issue of the WIA journal, Amateur Radio.

A service at the Port Macquarie Crematorium on 4th September was attended by many relatives, friends, and a large delegation of members of ORARC was present to share their loss and to pay their last respects to a popular and faithful member of our club.

Vale Ian (VK2XU)

Most club members will already be aware of the recent sad passing of Ian James David Dalrymple, VK2XU.

Ian had not enjoyed good health over the last 12 months and departed this life on 25 September 2003. He was predeceased by his wife, Betty in 1995 and is survived by children, Susan (Sue), Jane, Robert, brother Leonard, sister Marjorie and grandchildren Aron, Jessica, Libby, Lily and friend Miriam.

Ian was born on the 31 March 1926 in Castlemaine Victoria to parents Emily (nee Fenton) and Len. He lived a full life, devoted to his family, a man who was a great provider.

He had a love for life enjoying playing cricket in his younger days and in latter years watching rally cars, cricket and golf. He has been a member of the Probus Club, Golf Club, Oxley Region Amateur Radio Club and the Wireless Institute of Australia.


Most of his working life, Ian spent working for the PMG, which, in later life, took him to the top of Middle Brother Mountain as OIC of the Radio, Television Relay Station, a position he enjoyed until his retirement.

The family moved around having spent time in Melbourne, Orange, and Darwin, and, in 1964, to Port Macquarie, where they spent many happy years.

Ian, as a member of the ORARC, was a member of the Repeater group for many years and was a source of technical knowledge to be reckoned with.

He was in the forefront in assisting with the communications for the original Southern Cross Car Rally, which was run in the forests about Port Macquarie. He is known to have assisted many of our local Hams and Scouts with technical advice and as DX Engineering was the local Kenwood agent.

Although he enjoyed the local VHF activity, Ian's favourite band must have been 20-Metres, for this is where he kept in contact with his overseas friends. He was also a keen photographer and video enthusiast.

Digital Radio

Is it here on HF? Yes! Quite a few countries are now transmitting digital radio broadcasts on HF.

Three systems are currently being used, however the most popular is DRM, (Digital Radio Mondiale). You can hear it on your HF receiver, however you will need a special receiver to decode it or you will have to interface your current receiver with your computer.

Interfacing will require a 'down-converter' to convert the signals to 12 kHz for a computer sound card. The nominal digital signal is designed to fit within a bandwidth of 9-10 kHz, however there are broadcasts trying smaller bandwidths of 5 kHz and as big as 20 kHz.

The only two receivers known to offer direct DRM compatibility is the Ten-Tec 320D and WINRADIO G303i. It is forecast that by 2012, analog transmissions may be as obsolete as AM is to SSB.

I wonder if you are aware of any amateur stations using digital voice transmissions? (other than DSSTV). Details of a simple down-converter using a NE602AN was shown in October QST.

M&S Offset Billycart Classic At Beechwood

Well, despite O.R.A.R.C.'s glaring omission from the comprehensive list of credits recently published in the local press, we were again approached to provide the communications for the worthy annual charity event at Beechwood. We must have done it well in previous years!

Being the good natured bunch of chaps (for which we are widely known!) we provided a clutch of six volunteers to front up at the appointed time and set up shop, as we have done for the past several years, to assist the organisers make

a highly satisfactory and enjoyable event.

The volunteers were, in no particular order other than call sign, VK2AIF (David), VK2CHC (Richard - rejoining the club after some time wandering in the wilderness), VK2FSH (Charles), VK2TT (Trevor), VK2YOR (Roy) and VK2ZCW (Bill). They formed the crew that attended to the tasks required by the organisers.

These tasks involved the setting up of a 2-Metre Base station and a P.A. System to inform the gathered throng of proceedings, plus, equipping a "Commentary Vehicle" with radio communication (and riding in it during its exciting run down the mountain!) and, last but by no means least, providing hand-held communications between the starting grids and the base, during the running of the junior Billycart events.

The weather, although *just* meeting the category of fine, was not as balmy as previous years have been... a stiff breeze, and one or two sprinkles of rain did little more than cause some unfounded apprehension at times.

Technically, things took on a grim outlook at the beginning of the set-up session. When fired up, the hired P.A. system took an instant dislike to the presence of our 2-Metre emissions from the base station and hand-helds. It exhibited symptoms of serious RFI. This P. A. showed its dislike by producing quite rude noises whenever anyone touched their PTT's. (Reminiscent of the behaviour of a pampered, show-off, flighty, Brewery-horse).

Whilst these noises gave rise to occasional bursts of unbridled laughter from some vulgar elements within the crowd, they struck fear in the hearts of others... particularly those who were trying to find the cause and/or suppress these embarrassing effects that were threatening to mar the whole event, or worse still, ruin the reputation of the ORARC!

Richard produced some toroids to try and choke off the speaker leads, Charles stole some wire from somewhere to enhance the earthing, various other usually effective suggestions from within the group were tried, but still the P.A. persisted with its ribald equine emulation.

Then, serendipitously, a set of conditions was achieved, quite accidentally, which related to the geographical placement of the equipment... the P.A. suddenly calmed down, and performed in a most exemplary manner. The surprise of the day came at the end of the official trophy presentation for-



malities. The organisers called a representative of the ORARC to the podium and made a presentation of an attractive glass and brass plaque. It was suitably engraved with words of appre-

Richard (VK2CHC), whose business is now conducted from Beechwood, (in fact, right at the finishing line of the Billy Cart classic!) was standing in for the ORARC to switch off the PA. He accepted the plaque on behalf of the club, and responded appropriately. Thank you, Richard!

So, clearly, our efforts in the past have *not* gone unnoticed, and this token of recognition must show that our recent omission from the "credits" was one of those unfortunate oversights that can happen in the best of regulated circles!

Well done ORARC. We are still visible!

The organisers of the event were later able to hand over the proceeds in the form of a cheque for \$2,342.40 to the SES.

Did You Know This?


I thought this one may be of interest...

78 RPM

You may wonder why the phonograph (or was it called a gramophone) records run at 78 revolutions per minute.

Well a posting to one of the audiophile remailers explains it this way. Up until the 1920's recordings were made at a variety of speeds from 75 rpm to 84 rpm, and sometimes outside this range. The minimum acceptable speed was governed by the quality of the sound from the innermost grooves of the record. By trial and error this speed was found to be around 78 to 80 rpm.

The speed of records is based on the American electricity AC standard of 60 hertz. When engineers wanted to standardise the speed of recording equipment in the studios they started using synchronous electric motors. These are motors that are locked on to the 60 hertz power and run at precisely 3600 rpm. If you use simple gear ratios then 3600 divided by 46 is 78.26 rpm. All

other phonograph record speeds came from the same source as well. 3600 divided by 80 gave us the popular 45 rpm record that helped to make the rock and roll revolution. 3600 divided by 108 is responsible for the L-P 33 1/3 rpm record and divided by 216 made the somewhat rare 16 2/3 rpm disks. Of course most 'black flat' albums have been replaced by digital compact disks, but the history of grooved disks is an interesting one and now you know how it all came about.


Oxtales Printing


