


WRTC-96 UPDATE

Our local "brasspounding Olympian", VK2AYD, shouted out these few words as he dashed through the passenger lounge on his way for a week's holiday

in the Jewel of the Pacific, Norfolk Island. (I believe he was taking VK2DAL as his bag carrier on this jaunt.)

Special awards are being issued by the IARU for the WRTC-96 event which will take place on 13th/14th of July, 1996. The WRTC section is due to commence operations at 1200Z on 13th. Special one-letter call signs are being issued to each of the teams, e.g. W6A, K6B etc. David understands that he will be operating an OMNI-6 (Ten-tec) transceiver.



Back in July '95, two amateur astronomers, Alan Hale and Thomas Bopp discovered a new comet, now known as the Comet Hale-Bopp. It was discovered some 7.2 astronomical units from the Sun. Now, what's an astronomical unit you may ask. It's the nominal distance from the Earth to the Sun which is 150 million kilometres.

Comet Hale-Bopp is estimated to pass by planet Jupiter in March 1996 and then will head toward the Earth, passing us in April 1997. Its size is yet to be determined because of the fuzziness caused by the amount of gas and dust it was dispersing. It is thought to be big and could be very spectacular. We shall see!

1996 is going to be a very busy year for the Space Agencies around the world. It could be called the year of the Martian. In February the USA sent "Delta 2" off to look at asteroid Eros. (I always thought he was at Piccadilly Circus London).

In November both the USA and Russia are launching surveyor stations to circle Mars and eventually land and transmit information back to earth.

In December in the USA, their programme "Pathfinder" is being unfolded to explore the surface of Mars. So keep an ear open - you could really work some DX......!

For those of you that are contemplating following the weather satellites, at the time of writing there were 2 U.S. and 2 Russian satellites active in polar orbit. (NOAA 12 & 14 and Met 3/5 & 2/21). Only one Russian Satellite appears to be transmitting on 137 MHz at any one time. Obviously they are finding the cost of fuel expensive up there and are economising.

SANTA INQUIRY

The following was extracted from Email. From Brett Warden @syd.dcet.csiro.au

As a result of an overwhelming lack of requests, and with research help from that renowned scientific journal SPY magazine (January 1990) - I am pleased to present the annual scientific inquiry into Santa Claus.

- 1. No known species of reindeer can fly. BUT there are 300,000 species of living organisms yet to be classified, and while most of these are insects and germs, this does not COMPLETELY rule out flying reindeer which only Santa has ever seen.
- 2. There are 2 billion children (persons under 18) in the world. BUT since Santa doesn't (appear to) handle the Muslim, Hindu, Jewish and Buddhist children, that reduces the work load to 15% of the total 378 million according to Population Reference Bureau. At an average (census) rate of 3.5 children per household, that's 91.8 million homes. One presumes there's at least one good child in each.



3. Santa has 31 hours of Christmas to work with, thanks to the different time zones and the rotation of the earth, assuming he travels east to west (which seems logical). This works out to 822.6 visits per second. This is to say that for each Christian household with good children, Santa has 1/1000th of a second to park, hop out of the sleigh, jump down the chimney, fill the stockings, distribute

the remaining presents under the tree, eat whatever snacks have been left, get back up the chimney, get back into the sleigh and move on thenext house. Assuming that each of these 91.8 million stops are evenly distributed around the earth (which, of course, we know to be false but for the purpose of our calculations we will accept), we are now talking about 0.78 miles per household, a total trip of 75.5 million miles, not counting stops to do what most of us must do at least once every 31 hours, plus feeding and etc.

This means that Santa's sleigh is moving at 650 miles per second, 3,000 times the speed of sound. For purposes of comparison, the fastest man-made vehicle on earth, the Ulysses space probe, moves at a poky 27.4 miles per second - a conventional reindeer can run, tops, 15 miles per hour.

4. The payload on the sleigh adds another interesting element. Assuming that each child gets nothing more than a medium-sized Lego set (2 pounds), the sleigh is carrying 321,300 tons, not counting Santa, who is invariably described as overweight. On land. conventional reindeer can pull no more than 300 pounds. Even granting that "flying reindeer" (see point #1) could pull TEN TIMES the normal amount, we cannot do the job with eight, or even nine. We need 214,200 reindeer. This increases the payload - not even counting the weight of the sleigh - to 353,430 tons. Again, for comparison - this is four times the weight of the Queen Elizabeth, 5. 353,000 tons travelling at 650 miles per second creates enormous air resistance - this will heat the reindeer up in the same fashion spacecraft re-entering the earth's atmosphere. The lead pair of reindeer will absorb 14.3 QUINTILLION joules of

energy. Per second. Each. In short, they will burst into flame almost instantaneously, exposing the reindeer behind them, and create deafening sonic booms in their wake. The entire reindeer team will be vaporised within 4.26 thousandths of a second.

Santa, meanwhile, will be subjected to centrifugal forces 17,500.06 times greater than gravity. A 250-pound Santa (which seems ludicrously slim) would be pinned to the back of his sleigh by 4,315,015 pounds of force.

In conclusion - If Santa DID deliver presents on Christmas eve, he's dead now. - VK2AYD
