SUMMARY OF 1997 A.G.M.

The 1997 Annual General Meeting of ORARC was held on Saturday, February 1st, at the Gordon Street S.E.S. Headquarters. There was a roll-up of 22 members, and three visitors. Apologies were received from eight members.

The retiring President, David (VK2DAL), and the retiring Secretary, David (VK2AYD) were given a sincere vote of thanks from all those present for their 3-year period as members of the executive of O.R.A.R.C. Inc.

Visitors who attended the meeting were: Stan Ellis (VK2DDL - President of the Great Lakes ARC), Paul Graham, and Bill Barendsen.

The election of officers for 1997, brought two new faces to the executive. Bruce Walker (VK2HOT) was elected President, and David Tarrant (VK2HBC) was elected Secretary.

The main issues that were resolved at the AGM were:-

- (i) Membership subscriptions will remain at \$15 per annum for 1997
- (ii) The Membership Year and Financial year will now run from July 1st to June 30th of each year. (Notice of motion had been given in accordance with the rules, and the motion was carried). Rules of the club will be amended accordingly.
- (iii) The Rules of Incorporation will be reviewed and changes recommended where necessary, for submission to the Committee before the next AGM.

The club's financial statement shows cash assets of \$8,061. A surplus of \$254.23 over 1995.

Following the closing of the formal proceedings for the day, which included an ordinary general meeting for the month of February, a barbecue was held at the club rooms. BADEN DOES A MACARTHUR

Baden Gleeson has returned! It has got to be either "the best climate in NSW" or the best radio club, that drew him back to the mid-North Coast. Baden (VK2MOQ) who, a few years ago, moved to the far north of this state, remained a club member throughout his absence from the region. But... he appeared, large as life, at the AGM and tells us that he has returned to live at Port Macquarie. Welcome Home Baden!

ROSE

Have you noticed that the ROSE network is none too healthy lately? I won't bore you with herbaceous metaphors or puns, but yes, there is a problem.

Actually, ROSE "surfers", Wauchope and elsewhere, have long known the network to be a cranky beast at best. If you follow the bulletin traffic, you will see battles raging both in VK and overseas about maintaining a radio network in the face of the all-encompassing Internet. Well, one problem with our Amateur network is indeed that it is ultra-low cost and I mean ULTRA! Naturally, its performance matches this.

It is tempting to think of this as a baud rate problem, that we need to "go 9600" and everything will be better. This is NOT the case. A higher baud rate is simply a means to allow more retries to occur in a given time. The real problem is that our present "backbone" consists of a string of nodes all

hogging the one frequency, and all trying to chip in at once. The performance of this is appalling, and the effect of increasing, as is presently "in the pipeline", to 4800 baud, will be minimal.

The proposition agreed to by a consensus(!) of VK2 repeater managers North of Gosford is to upgrade to a 4800 baud full-duplex link system. 4800 baud appears to be at present a happy balance between performance and economy. Not only do higher speeds require more expensive modems, but higher performance radios, and this is the answer to "why are we putting up with 1200/ 4800 baud when they are using upwards of 28.8 kilobaud on the Internet?"

But I have said that the baud rate is not so important. The "full-duplex link system" is the part that needs to be developed before we will get anywhere. A link *system* is needed to overcome all the problems of hidden transmitters, simultaneous transmissions and retries. This means that every link from site to site must have its own frequency pair (one frequency in each direction) just as every link in the telephone system has two ends. Party lines are out!

The link from VK2RND (Newcastle) to VK2RGL has already been upgraded to 4800 baud but VK2RPM has not yet followed. Consequently, Great Lakes and Taree South (notable Karl's BBS) are enjoying a comparatively private link to Newcastle which is performing superbly. When we too go to 4800 baud, that link will actually slow down again until the second stage of the plan is implemented and individual links for each step are installed. THEN it will be possible to connect to Sydney within seconds and converse at a comfortable speed.

In the meantime our link south is "broken" unless you know how to use VK2DYX-1's "node" functions (Karl is accessible at present using VK2RPM-1 as a digipeater, and that is how we are getting much of our BBS traffic). But only when we make the necessary upgrades will Packet "come alive".

MEGAVISION

Another recent overseas development was the Combo MegaVision T3 DIGITAL BACK, an evolution from its successful T2 digital cameras system.

Unlike the T2, which is designed for multi pass image capture, the T3 BACK is designed for use as a single shot image capture device for medium format cameras (such as 6x6cm Hasselblad, Rolleiflex, etc.).

Amongst its many features are: rapid single shot capture of 2048x2048 pixel colour images at a rate of up to one frame per second, an advanced colour dye array, uses strobe or continuous light sources, PCI bus interface for which speed direct connect to Power Mac or PC systems and an optional belt-mounted power pack with removable disk drive for continuous shooting and large picture storage capabilities.

Sales of the Cambo Megavision T2 system have already topped the 300 mark in the States (at around US25,000 a pop) so expect this newer and more portable device to make a similar impact at the high end of the market.

Both models use the same chip which captures a 12MB file in 36 bit colour. Megavision claims that as its chips operate at room temperature, there is little need for

expensive cooling systems which makes them more economical, smaller and lighter. Contact Megavision (with your Megabucks card ready) e-mail: ken@megavision.com

THE PACKET SCENE

Meeting one of the members the other day at the local Fruit Market, the ensuing half-hour discussion touched on the fact that he had "given up" on Packet Radio although he thanked me for my efforts in getting his system operating (a long time ago). He mentioned that he had turned it on from time to time but "all he had seen was the BBS forwarding".

In various provocative bulletins on, surprise surprise!, the BBS; Stan VK2DDL from the Great Lakes club has likewise suggested that amateurs from that area have "given up" on the mode as they feel the BBS forwarding forever "occupies" the local channel.

It seems we have here a "mind-set" problem. The funny thing is of course that I recall exactly the opposite complaint about our Voice repeater(s), "there's never anyone on"!

Well, Packet is simply different to other modes, and you need to get that different mind-set. When you do, things fall in to place rather well.

On other modes, you wait until the station occupying the channel stops. On packet you do not. This is most important! Almost the very opposite is the case. If you see someone you wish to "speak" to (type to!) on the monitor screen, jump in and connect to them. You completely forget about the radio link, transmitting and receiving

Simply make a connection and type on. ~~For~~ do you wait for the other person to complete a sentence or even a line. **There are no "overs"**. You will be busy enough ~~typing~~ in the meantime.

There are **NO CQs** on Packet! If you really must, the closest equivalent is a "Beacon". This does not have to be very often, no more than every half-hour if that. It then appears in other stations monitor screens or MHeard lists and if they want to have a chat, they will. This idea (no "CQs") might seem strange, but is explained by the following points.

If the activity you see on the monitor screen (that is the "non-connected" screen, not just the computer screen) puts you off, simply turn the monitor function off! (command: MON OFF) Then it won't put you off anymore; you won't worry about whether you are "competing" with the BBSs or my huge file transfers! It's OK, you don't need it! It's there for you to satisfy your curiosity, not to direct what you do. The MHeard command (paKet: alt-H) will tell you who's been around lately which is all you need to know to guess whether there is anyone to talk to.

Disconnect the speaker. You don't need it and you don't want it! Anyone who can decode 1200 baud packets by ear is in line for a big prize (don't ask me who's offering it though) and a job with the circus. You may listen to the audio for testing purposes, but if you do it for longer than that, you either do or will need your head read.

Set your system up properly. John VK2VY and myself are happy to help you do this (unless you own a KAM). We seem to manage to do things, use the BBS and have conversations despite BBS forwarding, so we must be doing

something right. Talk to us and find out how!

Run a decent program such as paKet or BayCom if you are a beginner, with USERS 3, not 1. This allows other people to connect to you when they see you on the BBS or talking to another "live" operator as I have just suggested. USERS 1 operators who switch on, search the BBS for messages, disconnect and "pull the plug" are really unfriendly. From this comes the point:

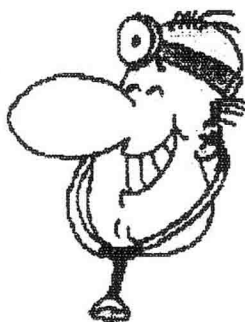
Leave the system running. I'm sure you can afford the electricity! And unless you really are into Heath-Robinson shack wiring, you shouldn't burn the house down. It should be stunningly obvious, but no-one can "talk" to you unless you are "on-air". This is the same as any other mode with one big exception: You now have a "robot butler" (the "man's man") to answer for you, either your TNC PMS, paKet if you leave your computer running or BayCom if you've gone for the "poor man's" option (an excellent way to "get your feet wet" by the way). Your computer (or TNC) is keeping watch on everything for you. You can even ask paKet to report (beep you) on a particular callsign, topic or any particular word going past on the screen, and you just "scroll" the screen back to find whatever you want.

You use the BBS by connecting to it (there are alternate tricks to this, but I am referring to the simple details). Do so! Connect regularly and do a listing with LR which lists everything since you last connected and did a "LR". If this is the first time, or you haven't connected regularly, you will get an ENORMOUS list but don't panic! You aren't going to be charged for it! Just look through the list

and select the bulletins that sound interesting (again, we can show you the "power user" tricks to do this) and use the R command to read those (you can put a whole list of numbers on the line after the "R", and those bulletins are read out in the order you specify) that look interesting. you soon learn that messages addressed to "ALL" are sent by people who can't think of a better "target" and correspondingly, aren't worth reading. You will find by reading the "TO" fields and the subjects that you can find things of interest and avoid the trivia. "Surf" the BBS.

I would like to say that you can "dial up" someone in Sydney, or even in Melbourne, Perth, Chicago (via an Internet "wormhole") and so on, via the **ROSE Network** but it is still under development. Only when there are many operators in this area using Packet and the demand is there can we proceed to get decent equipment put into service for the network repeaters or "nodes" and do those things easily. I hope to set up a "conference" server in the foreseeable future so that however many stations connect can operate an impromptu "chat net" with whatever they type distributed with identification to all other stations connected and vice-versa. How does that sound?
