SILENT KEYS

It is with sadness that OXTALES has to report the passing of two of our respected members during the month of May.

Peter Alexander (VK2PA) became a silent Key on 13th of June, passing away quietly at his home, "Nandari" Rollands Plains.

An Historical Summary of Peter's Amateur and community life appears elsewhere in this Newsletter.

Ken Beck (VK4WKB, ex-VK2WKB), whilst holidaying in Beijing, passed away suddenly on Thursday 22nd May. Ken lived in Port Macquarie for several years, serving a term as Secretary of ORARC Inc., before moving to and settling in Caloundra, Qld. At the time of going to press, we did not have the complete details of Ken's Amateur history to hand, but this will appear in the next issue of OXTALES.

Sincere sympathy is extended to the families of these two highly esteemed amateurs, from the membership.

Vale Peter Alexander -VK2PA

The Amateur Radio fraternity recently learned, with sorrow, of the passing of one of its widely known and highly respected members, Peter Alfred Hunt Alexander (VK2PA).

Peter, aged 74 years, became a silent key on 14th May, 1997, passing away quietly at his home, "Nandari" at Rollands Plains, near Port Macquarie, NSW.

Peter was born in Chatswood, NSW, and spent his childhood in Sydney and environs. He was the youngest, and only son, in a family of six. His father, Alfred Alexander, an operator with the Pacific Cable Board, taught Peter the art of Morse Telegraphy, which rapidly became Peter's second language.

Gaining his A.O.C.P with call sign VK2PA, at the age of 16, Peter began a long career in communications and electronics. Commencing an apprenticeship with AWA, he left this for strategic reasons to ensure a smooth entry into the armed services

Joining the R.A.A.F. in 1941, at the age of 18, Peter saw active service in Papua-New Guinea in the Milne Bay Area, and on Groote Island. His specialities were telegraph operating, HF-DF, VHF-DF, and Radar.

During his Groote Island service he was involved in aerial surveillance work, radioing valuable information on enemy aircraft movements back to allied headquarters in Darwin. Here he lived with the local Aboriginal people gaining tolerance and respect for indigenous people of Australia and the Pacific Region.

During the war years he met and married Ina Green. Ina was a serving member of the WRANS at the time.

On discharge from the RAAF in 1945, as a Sergeant, Peter remained in the RAAF reserve for the next 8 years. He and Ina moved to Port Macquarie NSW, where he established a radio repair business serving the surrounding area with general repairs and battery charging facilities for the non-electrified rural communities.

He was very active in community affairs, being a foundation member of the re-formed Port Macquarie RSL (of which he was later to become a director), a foundation member of the Oxley Region Amateur Radio Club and office bearer for many years. He was also an office-bearer in the local branch of the Air Force Association

In 1949, along with other well known ama-

teurs of the day (Col Fletcher - VKA2SF, Crieff Retallic - VK2XO, & Doug Gill - VK2SH), Peter formed the nucleus of the original group who first organised the famous Urunga Convention. As is well known this is the longest running annual amateur event in VK land.

His other interests included astronomy. As a foundation member of the Port Macquarie Astronomical Association (& its Secretary over several years beginning in 1961-1962), he was directly involved in the establishment of the still-functioning Observatory on the hill overlooking Town Beach and the breakwater at Port Macquarie.

One of Peter's outstanding community efforts was witnessed in the early 50's when disastrous floods in the region severed public communications links with the area. Peter established and controlled an emergency radio communications network through his amateur station at 97 Hill Street, Port Macquarie to link Sydney, Brisbane, and west to Narrabri and Forbes, and carry public messages.

In 1956, Peter and his family moved to Fiji where Peter initially worked in Suva, but some months later moved to Vatukoula where he worked for the next 4 years in the Emperor Gold Mine. He was an active amateur throughout this period under call sign VR2CD.

A DX-pedition to the Tokelau Island Group, on board "Maroro" (the refitted and renamed private yacht of the late Queen Salote of Tonga), saw Peter as part of the crew and operating team. The team headed up by "Doc" Meredith, W5PQA, (ENT Specialist to the first US Astronauts), spent a week in the Tokelaus providing more than 3000 DX hunters with rare contacts.

On his return to Port Macquarie, Peter established Alexander's TV, a business which he successfully operated until his retirement in 1976. The business operates to this day, un-

der its original name, but with new owners.

Peter and Ina retired to a rural life style, first in nearby Ballengarra, and later to their current property "Nandari", at Rollands Plains. Peter's amateur activities at "Nandari" involved an extensive "antenna farm" with modern equipment, working various modes, but predominately his first love, CW. He would sometimes stoop to "lip-flapping" (as he dubbed voice communication) but most amateurs remember Peter for his dedication to, and superior expertise in, Morse telegraphy.

Within the amateur fraternity, Peter was well known for his Morse Telegraphy operating skills. He won many trophies at Field Day contests in both Morse receiving and sending. He won the Golden Key Award, sponsored by the ORARC. The trophy for that award is soon to become the centre piece for a VK2PA Memorial Award being sponsored by this club. (see elsewhere in this Newsletter).

Peter also held other calls throughout the years. Whilst always holding VK2PA, he held VR2DA, ZM7DA, & G3OCM

Peter's passing brought to a close, his 58 years of progressive communications activity. His contribution to this nation's security, its communities in which he lived and served, and the fraternity we all enjoy, has been most noteworthy. His dedication and steadfast approach to the preservation of Amateur standards and his vigilance in helping keep the bands free of interlopers and sloppy operating practices were well known. Over the years he encouraged and assisted many other aspiring amateurs to gain the knowledge and expertise required to qualify for an amateur licence. Amateur radio has lost another one of its champions.

Affiliated Clubs Report

On May 10th, David, K2AYD, atended the WIA Affiliated Clubs Conference at Sydney, on behalf of the ORARC. Twenty-two

delegates from nineteen clubs were in attendance as well as eleven WIA Officers. The object of the meeting was to exchange ideas and discuss WIA business effecting clubs.

Some of the interesting subjects were a proposal to have a complete voice repeater coverage from Melbourne to Brisbane, similar to that being used in New Zealand. It was also proposed this would be based on the number of WIA members in the club. Your representative made two proposals. (a) That the WIA seek, through the Minister of Tourism to the Minister of Communications, that Australia have a "no fee" licence for visiting Amateurs similar to New Zealand. This has a time period of 28 days. It was also proposed by our Rep., that the WIA consider the insurance scheme to protect members and their equipment at a cost of \$10 per year. This will take some time for them to digest!

A lot of discussion was given to promotion and the WIA asked clubs to provide more information on their activities so that it could be included in the weekly broadcasts, Amateur Radio Magazine and on their Internet Web site.

VK2AGW runs a club net on the 1st and 3rd Sunday of each month on 3595KHz and asks that club members join in.

The next Conference of Clubs is scheduled for November 15, and we should again have a member present.

Contests

I know most of you don't involve yourselves with contests, but I'm sure you must hear them in progress on the HF bands each month. In May there were only 4 major contests of which the CQ Magazine WPX CW was by far the most active, being world wide.

This contest is based on the number of prefixes that you QSO and with the Japanese and USA having so many new combination call signs, it doesn't take long to rack up a big score. The contest lasts for 48 hours, but operating time is restricted to 36 hours for single ops.

I operated for 26 hours, worked 1025 stations, 378 prefixes and scored 1.23 million points. Unfortunately, my 80/40M dipole shorted out on my new shed, so most of my scoring had to be done on 20/15/10. Yes 10 does open and I worked both Japan and a number of USA stations.

June is a big month with nine or more contests, including the VK Novice Contest. Unfortunately, the All Asia DX Contest is on the same day (June 21/22), but this shouldn't interfere with the Novice Contest, although the overall QRM will be quite high. July has the world wide IARU HF Championship test (SSB/CW) on July 12/13.

That will be a big one. SO you don't like CW? Then try some SSB and work DX that you wouldn't normally hear on the bands.

Put your shoulders to the tasks.


