The Origin of "73"

The traditional expression "73" goes right back to the beginning of the landline telegraph days. It is found in some of the earliest editions of the numerical codes, each with a different definition, but each with the same idea in mind -it indicated that the end or signature, was coming up. But there are no data to prove that any of these were used.

The first authentic use of 73 is in the publication The National Telegraph Review and Operators Guide, first published in April 1857. At that time, 73 meant "My Love to you!" Succeeding issues of this publication continued to use this definition of the term. Curiously enough, some of the other numerals used then had the same definition as they have now, but within a short time, the use of 73 began to change.

In the National Telegraph Convention, the numeral was changed from the Valentine-type sentiment to a vague sign of fraternalism Here, 73 was a greeting, a friendly "word" between operators and it was so used on all wires.

In 1859, the Western Union Company set up the standard "92 Code". A list of numerals from one to 92 was compiled to indicate a series of prepared phrases for use by the operators on the wires. Here, in the 92 Code, 73 changes from a fraternal sign to a very flowery "accept my compliments", which was in keeping with the florid language of the era.

Over the years from 1850 to 1900, the many

manuals of telegraphy show variations of this meaning. Dodge's The Telegraph Instructor shows it merely as "compliment". The Twentieth Century Manual of Railway and Commercial Telegraphy defines it two ways, one listing as "my compliments to you;" but in the glossary of abbreviations it is merely "compliments." Theodore A.Edison's Telegraphs Self-Taught, shows a return to "accept my compliments". By 1908, however, a backward look at the older meaning, in another part of the work, where it also lists it as "compliments".

"Best regards" has remained ever since as the "put-it-down-in-black-and-white" meaning of 73 but it has acquired over-tones of the much warmer meaning. Today, amateurs use it more in the manner that James Reid had intended that it be used -"a friendly word between operators."

VALE KEN BECK - VK4WKB

Amateur Radio lost another of its "old timers" with the sudden passing of Ken Beck on 30th of May, 1997. Ken was spending a short holiday in Beijing, in the company of his brother, where he suffered a fatal heart attack.

Many members will recall that Ken, when he moved to Port Macquarie in 1988, that he joined ORARC, and became an active member who regularly attended meetings and held the office of Secretary in 1990-1991. During that period, Ken officiated as Chief Chef for the 1991 Field Day Weekend taking on the role of "Poppa Guiseppe" to produce a massive Spaghetti Bolognaise to serve the multitudes attending the Saturday evening social dinner at Tacking Point Surf Club Pavillion.

Ken & XYL Lois, came to settle in Port Macquarie when he retired from a career, that over 40 years, took him to distant islands in

the Pacific region. He served in Nauru, Canton Island, Christmas Island, Fiji, and Papua-New Guinea, involved primarily in fuelling operations for the air transport industry.

Many of the locations where Ken was stationed had poor, unreliable, and sometimes non-existent public communications services, with the result that Amateur Radio played a major part in his life in "out of the way" places. There were occasions where use of his amateur equipment was required for official communications to the outside world.

It is not widely known, but quite true, that amateur radio played an important role during his courtship with Lois, when work demands took Ken from Melbourne to far away places. Through the help of a neighbouring Amateur Bill Wells (then a VK3, but now an active VK4), Lois, was able to keep in regular touch with Ken at his remote locations

Ken held many callsigns which included VR2KW, 3D2KW, T31KW, and more recently VK2WKB & VK4WKB

He was a great achiever, with immense energy, drive and wide ranging interests. Ostensibly retired, Ken was seldom idle and he maintained his strong business interests and ties with his Pacific Island and mainland partners and friends. Despite his business activities in Australia and the Pacific, Ken always managed to devote plenty of time to regular schedules and amateur activities

Ken is sadly missed by many close friends throughout Australia and the Pacific Region.

CALL SIGN REGAINED.

ACA

Effective July 1 a new regulator for telecommunication and radio communications was

formed. Called the Australian Communications Authority (ACA). It encompasses the former Australian Telecommunications Authority (AUSTEL) and the Spectrum Management Agency (SMA). According to the press release they are encouraging industrial bodies and Associations (such as the WIA) to develop voluntary codes of practice rather than have these imposed by government regulations. Now we shall be able to measure the effectiveness of the WIA.

Dick Smith Electronics

Is now back in Port Macquarie. Located in Clarence Street at the entrance to Port Central Shopping Mall. They are very interested in supporting our Club and although at the moment they have little Amateur equipment on display, they would be pleased to keep stocks if they knew what we wanted.

AR Lectures

Over the past 18 months David VK2AYD, has given over 12 lectures and talks on Amateur Radio to various service clubs around the Hastings. These have been to Rotary Clubs, Lions Clubs, Probus Clubs and Masonic Fellowship meetings. In August he gave a talk and demonstrated equipment to the Lions Club of Wauchope and South West Rocks. If you know of Clubs wanting speakers, you have a good volunteer here.

Antenna crunch

Didja hear about the 2AYD adventure dropping his tower? The beam needed servicing so with the help of 2DAL he decided to drop the tower. When it passed the 45 deg angle the cable broke and it descended to earth rather rapidly. There will be some delay before AYD returns to the HF bands with a big signal !!!

VK2TT and the Lurgie

Following his sojourn around the out-back of Australia he acquired (at no charge) a dose of the dreaded lurgie. This has put him in a horizontal plane for a while. Mail-drops have had to be arranged to keep the contamination contained. Regular disinfection and spraying of his packet keyboard has also been necessary to ensure the virus was not transmitted via the digipeater to other users. He has promised to write a specific programme that we can use to ensure our computers have not been contaminated.

Satellite Receivers

A company called Worldspace, in conjunction with Panasonic, Sanyo and JVC are about to launch a new generation of radio receivers designed to receive broadcast programmes direct from satellites.

ATV

Bill, VK2WST, is now active with ATV, transmitting in the 70 cm band which is Channel 16 (Band 4) on the older TV sets. (Most modern TV sets in Australia don't start their UHF range until Channel 20 or 28). A few of the portable sets cover Channel 16. Bill is keen to hear from anyone interested in exploiting ATV.

Amateur Radio Day

September 20 is Amateur Radio Day. We were originally going to install a station at the Port Post Office, but at the August club meeting it was decided not to. Instead it is now proposed to hold a picnic at Ellenborough Reserve. From 12 noon onward. BYO. The BBQ will be there for cooking. To get to the Reserve, take the first turning on the right after you pass over the bridge at Ellenborough. (The next turning right is to the Police Station).

The VK2PA-Estate.

The Amateur equipment Peter had, is now with Mark, VK2XFK, Telephone 015401508. This includes 2M equipment, antenna's etc.

One special rig is the FT767GX that Peter had. It covers all the HF bands plus 6M plus 2M plus 70cM. The ultimate in rigs. Asking price is around \$2900. VK2XFK has a list.

ENCROACHMENT ON 70cM.

According to the WIA Amateur Radio magazine, the commercials have horned in on our 70cm band with LIPD's (Low Interference Potential Devices).

These are typically door openers, radio key

rings, wire-less stereo headphones, etc.. Their range is supposed to be limited to about 10 metres as the power permitted is only 215mW. Frequencies used are between 433.05 and 434.79 mHz.

It was brought into Australia from the European continent where certain expensive cars (which shall be nameless, but we know of one of our members who drives one) use them for door and security systems.

Most LIPD's here seem to be in the 300 MHz band, but it seems the Euro's have big power over our authorities here. So if you are on 70cm and find some one's garage door opening, or their car flasing lights, don't be surprised.

PAGERS.

The UK now have a system there that, providing you have the correct modem, you can send messages, via your telephone to a pager transmitter that will provide the receiver with up to 160 characters. Basically - Packet Radio (or e-mail) on your belt.

MEMBERSHIP SUBS.

Membership Subscriptions are not being renewed as promptly as could be reasonably expected. It will be HAND launched by the MIR cosmonaut and like the original it will transmit a bleep signal on 20 MHz. It should commence orbit around October 4 and last for about a month.

It has been suggested that we contact our local schools during this period and take along a 20 MHz receiver so that they can listen to it. With this, you could include some history on satellites and Amateur Radio. Let the young people know about our hobby.
