The following interesting snippett was submitted by VK2AYD who received it off e-mail.



Yes, I still enjoy them and wish a few more of you would join me. They can be great fun and you join in if only to see how many countries you can work in a given time.

For example, in the CQWW (CW) contest in November, I made 1,687 QSOs in 26 hrs (av 65/hr) in 85 countries. In the 10 metre contest in December (cw and ssb), I made 657 QSOs (527 cw and 130 ssb) in 17 hrs (av 39/hr) in 51 countries. That band really is a good band to use.

Don't think my scores were great, they were poor. I heard VK4EMM with a serial number of 1140 and ZL1DX at 1500 QSO's. The next big contest is in February - why not join me? de VK2AYD.

What do You Reckon?

Is it really true that the year 2000 will be a Leap Year? If such will be the case, has there ever been a "Century Year" that was a Leap Year ?. If so, what year was it? If there never was such a "Century Year", is there a reason? Let's have some answers for publication in next OXTALES. The answer that is considered, by a panel of faceless judges, to be the "best" answer (and it doesn't have to be correct) will be published in February's issue. First prize will be a complementary autographed copy of OXTALES. Second prize will be TWO complementary autographed copies of OXTALES. (The honouring of these prizes is conditional on the Autographer being available on his return to Australia from holidays in Spain. He is a Mr. C. Skase.)

HARD LABOUR.

Member, Allan Madigan, dug this one up out of his scrap book of Telegraphist's Memorabilia. It is told by a Mr. Reg Walker:-

"A long time ago, I read something written by 'Spru' (I believe), which described the daily load carried by a Morse operator. As best I can recall, it ran like this:

A Morse key weights 4 ounces (approx.). Each letter necessitates 4 upward plus 4 downward movements = $8 \times 4 = 32$ ounces. On the average there are approximately 6 letters to each word = 6×32 ounces (2lb) = $1920 \times (12 \text{ lb})$. Each minute, a good operator sends at twenty seven words per minute = $27 \times 12 \text{lb} = 324 \text{lb}$. Each hour = $60 \times 324 \text{lb} = 19,440 \text{lb}$. For a six hour day = $6 \times 19,440 \text{lb} = 116,640 \text{lb}$. Divid-

ing 116,640lb by 2,240 (lbs in a ton) equals 52 tons 160lb EACH DAY... ON ONE HAND - Not a bad effort."

(Apologies to the younger generation for the imperial rendition, but metrification would have been something of an anachronism in such a story... Ed.)

Historic Snippets.

David (VK2HBC), has been gathering some interesting historic facts relating to communications over the years. He has provided some for presentation in OXTALES.

Here is the first, which David extracted from History of the RAN in 1914/1918 war. Pacific Zone. David has promised some more.

1. Wireless Equipment.

It must be realised that wireless equipment in the era of the years 1910-1914 was primitive to our enlightened knowledge of today. What is perhaps not so well known is that the UK factories and the local post office were very jealous of their inventions and guarded their rights with vigour, even when that knowledge was required for the protection of Australia.

The Australian authorities, as war had started, were then forced to rely upon locally produced equipment. One such "technical" factory was at Randwick, in Sydney, and was directed by a religious clergyman. This factory made and repaired electrical machinery (Dynamos) and other electrical apparatus. This equipment was installed in the naval ships, HMAS's HUON, TORRENS and SWAN. Equipment was also supplied to Transport ships, Colliers, Patrol Boats and the Indian Government. A military type set was developed and placed in the Pacific zones. The reader is to be reminded that the German government had control, and stationed garrisons, on the islands to the north of Australia at this time.

Reception of war warnings received from naval stations were heard on receivers developed by the same factory. Developed and manufactured were five kilowatt (5kW) arc continuous wave transmitters which provided a greater range of operation than that which had previously been obtained. The design and construction of an oscillator (two coil type) for quick change in frequency was also carried out.

A new type of aerial tuning coil unit was also developed by this "factory".

The question now to be asked is....."Do we ever learn?".

It should be noted that the frequencies used at this time were in the range of 120kHz (2500 metres) to 1000kHz (300 metres).



CLUB'S HISTORY THROUGH OX-TALES.

Many of our current members, the young OM's, and even the OT's who joined within the last ten or so years, are probably unaware of the origins of this Newsletter, OXTALES, or the formation and early doings of this long standing club. Lester (VK2BFP) is doing some-

thing constructive about making this knowledge available to all.

Lester is a long standing member of the club, having held office for many years, and is currently engaged in a worthy attempt to gather together as many copies of the early issues of OXTALES as he can, for preservation, and research. Lester recognises the value in the Newsletter's content, as being a valuable source of reliable historical facts relating to the ORARC's activities over the years. To assist in a "hunter-gatherer" exercise, Lester is seeking the membership support and participation in dredging up the old copies of our newsletter.

For the historically mined, The first OX-TALES was produced in 1980, by Lester... see elsewhere in this issue.

At our well attended monthly meeting (it was quite a surprise roll up!) in November, Lester gave a short address to those present, regarding his self initiated project aimed towards recovery of historic issues of OXTALES. For the benefit of the "Newcomers", Lester had produced some photocopies of early issues which he handed around to members who were "short on years of membership" and as a consequence, short on knowledge of our bygone years.

So, the word is, for the longer standing members particularly, dig into those old drawers, boxes, bookshelves, or whatever, chase out the silverfish, spiders, and dust and see it there are any old OXTALES hiding in there that will help fill in the gaps in the sequence, for Lester.

A special vote of thanks is due to Lester, who, over many years has been a continuous supporter of the club. In one or more

periods of time, he single-handedly produced OXTALES without the aid of modern techniques, and is now making this worthwhile contribution to the club's wellbeing, history and future. Thanks OM!

Pictures for OXTALES.

Seeing some of the pictures that were reproduced in some of Lester's copies of early OXTALES, prompted the thought that we should be doing just that sort of thing with our newsletter in the 90's. After all, it was done in earlier years with good clarity on the equipment that was then employing that era's leading edge technology, we should be doing it today, because we have the where-with-all to produce good pictures.

Unfortunately, my scanner became a casualty in my "Night of the Big Bang" event, way back in May, but I still have the necessary software with which to process graphics files. So if anybody out there with scanning facilities (and I know who some of them are.. eh John?) could assist by producing some appropriate .GIF, .BMP, or .WOTEVER graphics files (recognising the dimensional constraints imposed by our 8-page format), I would be eager to "plug them in" to our Newsletter.

It would be desirable to produce as our first photograph, on the occasion of our "re-entry" to the world of illustrations, one of general interest to all the members, with perhaps some historical significance... say a current photograph of our most senior (Anno Domini-wise) member.

Future possibilities are, of course, endless... a co-operative XYL or YL in a centre-fold, for a gala issue? or perhaps a future Head of State opening our 2001 Field Day Weekend (be that whom, or what, it may).

Lampoonery aside, I believe it would be worthwhile to reintroduce some pix to liven up our pages, and I look forward to some views, and perhaps help with appropriate subject matter, and files with which to do it.

The Packet Scene.

Decisions taken at the November meeting of ORARC, altered slightly the course on which it had earlier been agreed to proceed. It had been planned to first upgrade the current DR200 installation to ROSE Version 3.7 before embarking on the upgrade to 4800 bps on the backbone.

Following the November 1st decisions, moves have been set in place to proceed as soon as possible towards the decommissioning the DR200, and replacing it with a back-to-back TNC arrangement. This will facilitate a faster transition to 4800 bps on the back-bone.

The above plan also includes moves to establish our VK2RCN digipeater, which has been pending for some time. Assistance was sought from A.A.P.R.A. in the acquisition of three Tiny-2 TNC's to bring the above decisions to fruition. A.A.P.R.A. has formally responded favourably, and we are awaiting the supply of the TNC's which are now on order by A.A.P.R.A. from USA.


the QTH of Lester, (VK2BFP).
