same as those of last year. Ordinary Membership remains at \$40 per annum. Associate Membership remains at \$20 per annum. Distant Membership remains at \$10 per annum. Family Membership remains as a single fee equal to the membership fee for the most expensive membership included in the members covered by the family membership. For example two Distant members covered by a Family Membership would pay just a single fee of \$10. An Ordinary Member and an Associate Member included in a Family Membership would pay just a single fee of \$40. Two Ordinary Members covered by a Family Membership would pay just a single fee of \$40.

It is important that all members renew their memberships and also encourage those who are currently not members to join or rejoin ORARC. The more members we have, the easier it is to keep our fees low. The club has a lot of fixed expenses and we rely on membership subscriptions to cover those expenses. Your membership subscription is greatly valued.

Annual General Meeting

The 2019 Annual General Meeting takes place at 2 pm on Saturday the 3rd of August 2019 in the SES Building, Central Road, Port Macquarie. Now is the time to consider nominating for one of the club office bearer positions. They all become vacant at the AGM. The strength of the club lies in having an active Committee to inspire and lead the club to do the many worthwhile things that enable the Oxley Region Amateur Radio Club live up to all of its objectives to serve its members and the community, and to promote Amateur Radio as a hobby. The formal Notice of the Annual General Meeting and nomination form accompany this issue of Oxtales.

The current Committee has worked very hard to make the club's 2018 – 2019

Financial Year a very successful one. The continuing sound financial position has enabled the club to embark on a number of innovative projects to provide infrastructure to support advances in radio communications. The club already has repeaters at Middle Brother Mountain and at Telegraph Point which support both analogue FM and C4FM System Fusion digital voice. EchoLink is available on the VK2RPM 146.7 MHz Middle Brother Both Middle Brother repeater. Telegraph Point have APRS digipeaters for real time GPS tracking. The VK2RCN 53.8 MHz 6 metre analogue FM repeater has been installed at Telegraph Point. Education has always been an important role of the club and it is significant that some members have already upgraded their licences to enable them to operate on 6 metres, and to use the digital modes.

Club Projects

The major project is the establishment of a repeater site for the VK2RCN Repeaters at Telegraph Point. The proposed site is a few kilometres along the ridge line from the existing VK2RCN site. The club has enjoyed a very generous usage of the existing site excellent for many years. The maintenance including requires replacement of the guy wires. There is significant cost in this work and to look after members' interests in expending club funds in this way there should be a formal agreement for continuing tenancy. The current arrangement is a mutually amical informal one but expected future changed family circumstances preclude being able to enter into a binding tenancy term. While the current informal arrangement will happily continue under the present circumstances, it is prudent to look at establishing a new site with a formal site lease.

Establishment of the proposed new site will require setting up a formal lease and then obtaining a Development Approval from the Port Macquarie Hastings Council before construction can Continued from previous page commence. A sub-committee has been set up to undertake the task. So far the proposed new site location has been identified and coordinates for the site and the proposed route for a mains power supply cable identified. Once the site drawings have been completed the lease will be negotiated and a Development Application submitted for Council Approval. The drafting and legal work is being done pro bono.

Once the DA is approved the work to bring power to the site, construct an equipment building and to erect the new mast can commence. John McLean VK2KC has kindly donated the new mast. Donations in cash and kind for the project are continuing to be sought. Following the excellent work by Paul Jones VK2DEL, some funds are already in hand.

If you would like to contribute to the work of the sub-committee please contact the ORARC Committee.

It is planned to set up an additional UHF multi-mode digital voice repeater at each of the club's repeater sites. The club is indebted to Paul Colledge VK2ICQ for researching and developing a cost effective solution. The new repeaters will be fitted with MMDVM repeater controllers which support C4FM, Dstar, DMR and P25 digital voice modes. It is expected a firmware upgrade to the MMDVM controllers will

add support for NXDN as well. Paul has constructed a prototype repeater using this hardware has developed hardware and software to provide fail-safe control and monitoring of all the site repeaters. This will enable the intelligent linking of the two sites to facilitate linking at least the VK2RCN and VK2RPM 2 metre repeaters. It will also support a relay of the weekly VK2WI news broadcasts. Planning is under way to install the new equipment and link at the existing VK2RCN repeater site to enable full testing to be completed. A working bee will be called when the work is to be done. Only minor work will be required to relocate this equipment to the new Telegraph Point site when it is ready.

Club Activities

Thank you to everyone for participating in club activities. ORARC runs a surprising number of activities and events each year. These range from the Monthly General Meetings, the Friday night get-togethers on the third Friday of each month, the weekly Sunday morning and Thursday evening club nets on the VK2RPM 146.7 MHz Middle Brother Repeater, the Wednesday morning working bees, and of course special events such as the Christmas Party, the annual Field Day on the June long weekend, and the Antenna Shootout. The club station VK2BOR participates in the John Moyle Field Day, the Remembrance Day contest, the International Lighthouse and Lightship weekend, and the Jamboree on the Air. In addition, club members provide the safety communications for events such as the Beechwood Billycart Classic, the annual White Ribbon Walk in Port Macquarie, and car rallies in the area.







ACMA proposed changes to licence conditions

The Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA) has conducted a review of licence conditions that apply to amateur radio operators with Foundation, Standard and Advanced level qualifications.

The amateur service is a longstanding user of the radiofrequency spectrum, with a range of bands made available for qualified amateurs. It is designed primarily to facilitate hobby radiocommunications and technical experimentation.

The ACMA supports the amateur service through planning arrangements which recognise the desires of amateur radio operators to access frequency bands, while balancing other demands for spectrum.

In the Draft five-year spectrum outlook 2019–23 (draft FYSO), the ACMA indicated it would commence consultation on potential changes to amateur licensing conditions in Q4 2018–19.

Our review considered various requests for changes to licence conditions in submissions made by amateur peak bodies—the Wireless Institute of Australia (WIA) and the Radio Amateur Society of Australia (RASA).

The ACMA is also taking the opportunity during this process to consult on our proposals to remove amateur advanced licensees' access to the 3575–3600 MHz band within areas reallocated for spectrum licensing. The purpose of these changes is to prevent cancellation of advanced amateur licences that would otherwise occur as a result of the reallocation of the 3575–3700 MHz band (the 3.6 GHz band) to spectrum licensees.

This paper sets out our proposals for public consideration. We are seeking stakeholder views on the following:

the removal of amateur advanced licensees' access to the 3575–3600 MHz band within specified areas

changes that progress various requests of the amateur community, that will account for technological changes, reduce restrictions and increase flexibility for licensees

changes that respond to requests by the amateur community for the medium term, that will increase flexibility for licensees additional proposals for change that we have identified for the medium term to longer term aimed at reducing the overall regulatory burden of amateur licensing arrangements.

Equipment from the Past

Receiver-Transmitter RT-70/GRC - MILITARY U.S



This is a photograph taken at the Oxley Amateur Radio Club Inc,'s recent field day of an item that was offered for sale on one of the disposal tables.

These radio sets were manufactured in the 1950's and were valve operated. They needed a voltage supply of 6 volts for the valve filaments and 90 Volts for the valve plates. This voltage was supplied by either a mains power supply or a vibrator power supply.

The set design was a superhet with double or triple conversion and covered the frequency range of 47 to 58.4 MHz.

Modulation was FM with a power output of less than 1 Watt. The sets were designed to be used to give reliable coverage within a 1.6 Km (I mile) range and be operated in tanks, other vehicles or as a field based radio.

Audio output was to headpones or fed into an external amplifier for extrernal speaker use. These radio's were extremely rugged and at the time considered to be relatively light weight at 7 kg.

The basic design was manufactured by several NATO countries and the sets were considered to be of an extremely robust design.

Tuning was continuously variable between 47 and 58.4 Mhz. However they could be set up mechanically to have two preset channels to simplify net use.

Above pictue give a clearer indication of what the purpose of the controls.

Editors note: It would be interesting to find out the history of the unit on the disposal table and also if it were sold on the day.

Blast from the Past

Blast from the past is the section in Oxtales where we look back into the past to see what the club was doing at that time. This months 'Blast' is taken from the July 2007 edition of Oxtales.

The president at that time was Alan Nutt VK2GD (SK), Vice president Bruce Walker VK2HOT, Treasurer John McLean VK2KCE now VK2KC and secretary Jim Neal VK2VIV. With the exception of VK2GD all are still current active members of the club. In 2007 we had 47 members compared with the 78 of today.

The following is an interesting comment on the Fox Hunting activity at the 2007 Field Day.

'Cunning Foxes Can't Elude the Wily Hounds'

ORARC's crafty foxes, Jim VK2VIV and Larry VK2CLL, demonstrated unprecedented slyness in the placement of hidden transmitters at the June long weekend field day. However, their Machiavellian antics were no match for ORARC's resident hound, Craig VK2ZCM and regular visitors Chris VK2YMW and Arnold VK2ADA.

Overall Foxhunt champion, by a hound's whisker, was VK2ZCM. Craig has developed outstanding technical abilities in all facets of fox hunting. He constructed the 80 metre transmitter used in the events. This is a programmable unit that is capable of working into any aerial, from a piece of wet string to a chain wire fence, without an ATU.

Craig was without peer in both the 80 metre championship event and the Saturday practice event. This was largely because of the excellent 80 metre DF'ing aerial set-up on the roof racks of his car. Chuffed with his success in Saturday's practice events, and a pleasant dinner in town with the XYL that evening, Craig arrived home and drove straight into the car-port, forgetting the precious and complex equipment above his head. The damage was extensive and Craig worked into the early hours of Sunday morning rewinding ferrite rod aerials and straightening bent bits and pieces. Needless to say, he had his gear working perfectly again for the main event.

The number of participants was down this year because of the appalling weather conditions down south but competitors, who made it

to Port Macquarie, enjoyed ideal conditions for all events'.

Editors note: It is interesting to note that we are still using Craig's 80 metres foxes today.

Arthur VK2ATM has been interested in small bandwidth transmissions for many years. The following is an extract from the 2007 July edition of Oxtales where Arthur had been experimenting with the BPSK31 mode of transmission.

'Digital BPSK31

Most newcomers to Amateur radio have computers. Some have dedicated computers in-terfaced with their transceivers, yet few have migrated to digital modes. Perhaps it's consider something akin to the internet, but be assured that is not so. Perhaps they believe Packet Radio is the only system available to Amateurs. Again, not so!

Amateur Radio digital communication encompasses over 50 different modes and some programmes, such as "Multipsk" and "Mix-W", give you the capabilities to receive most of these. It ranges from SSTV to keyboard-to-keyboard transmissions. It even includes CW which was the first digital mode!

One of the most popular modes is PSK31 (Phase Shift Keying) and if you really want tosee something fascinating, download the programme "Digipan" off the internet, (or buy the club's "HamStuff" CD produced by Arthur VK2ATM) install and watch and read on your computer up to 20 stations all transmitting within a 2 kHz band. Yes I did say 20. The band-width of a BPSK31 signal is just 62.5 Hz., so there is plenty of room inside a 2 kHz band-width.

You will need a very simple interface (a simple mini 1:1 600 ohm transformer for isola- tion purposes) to connect the transceiver output to the input of your sound card'.
