#### **RD Contest and ILLW 2019**

This year the Remembrance Day contest and the International Lighthouse and Lightship Weekend both took place on the weekend of the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> of August 2019. In past years when the two events have coincided, the club station VK2BOR has operated from the club's communication caravan located in the carpark at the Tacking Point Lighthouse for both the ILLW and RD Contest. However, this year the Port Macquarie Hastings Council undertook a major upgrade of the road to the Lighthouse during the winter months and the Lighthouse was not accessible for the weekend. Thank you to Bob Ecclestone VK2ZRE for obtaining agreement from the ILLW organisers for ORARC to operate VK2BOR from the carpark of the Tacking Point Surf Life Saving Club as the closest practical site to the Lighthouse.

Thank you to Col Terry VK2LCT for towing the club's communications caravan to the Tacking Point Surf Life Saving Club carpark on the Saturday morning. The carpark was almost Continued on next page

full despite the early morning arrival. The surprisingly large number of participants in the dawn bootcamp and the early morning surfers had taken over the carpark. Fortunately, there was just one suitable car space available and Col did a great job in shoe-horning the caravan into that space. Well done Col.

Thank you to everyone who arrived early to set up the caravan. Special thanks go to John Bailey VK2KHB and newly appointed Social Director Ivan Southwell VK2IJS for cooking the breakfast bacon and eggs and the lunch and dinner sausages. Cooking on the Council-installed electric barbeque was a bit of a challenge in the wind. At lunch time the wind was particularly strong and Ivan had to work hard to keep the wind blown sand away from the barbeque plate. His vigilance paid off as the sausages were grit free.

Due to the limited space available to install HF antennas in the public space at the

carpark it was decided to erect just a single off-centre fed horizontal 80 metre dipole which neatly fitted into the space. A flagpole mast was attached to the side of the caravan to support the feed point of the dipole. The flag pole halyard made it easy to raise the 4:1 balun feed point to the top of the mast. The unguyed flag pole stood firm and steady in the wind. The antenna had a low VSWR on 80, 40, 20 and 10 metres, and worked well on all those bands. There had been some concern that electrical noise could have been a problem as the off-centre feeding of the 80 metre dipole was inherently unbalanced but this proved to be baseless as the noise level was surprisingly low on all bands. Toroid chokes were used at both ends of the coax feed line as a precaution. The noise level on the caravan's 5 band HF trap vertical antenna was much higher. As can be seen in the photographs the trap vertical bent significantly in the wind. See Photograph below.



Unfortunately HF propagation was particularly poor this year. The skip distance on 40 metres was very long during the day and the stations heard were mainly in VK3, VK5 and VK7. 20 metre stations were few and far between. Despite an excellent signal from VK2WI in Sydney during the RD opening broadcast at 1 pm, very few stations were heard on 80 metres during the day. Consequently only a relatively small number of lighthouses were worked this year. In the evening 80 metres worked well and nearly all the 42 RD contacts were made in the early evening on this band.

The club's Honda EU20i inverter generator ran for the full day on a single tank of fuel and provided high quality AC power. The generator was placed under its cover in front of the caravan inside a safety barrier. The generator is very quiet and simply could not be heard over the wind. There was no concern over exhaust fumes despite the close proximity of the generator to the caravan as the generator was down wind from the caravan.



It had been intended to operate through the night and during Sunday but given the poor propagation and the lack of volunteers to stay the night, it was decided to pack up at about 8 pm and not return on Sunday. The Saturday operation was a very enjoyable day with great participation in all the activities. The food was excellent and the

caravan provided an excellent operating environment.

Thank you to participants Col Terry VK2LCT, John Bailey VK2KHB, Rob Frost VK2CRF, Bob Ecclestone VK2ZRE, Ivan Southwell VK2IJS, John Hansen VK2AYQ, Lyle Smith VK2SMI, Bruce VK2HOT, Walker Des Thompson VK9FLHI, Darren Froggatt VK2MIA and Henry Lundell VK2ZHE. It was great to member John McDonagh have past VK2VY drop in to say hello and to return a 2 metre cavity filter to the club. In the past John was a keen participant in packet radio and the filter had been part of the club's packet radio digipeater equipment. # **JOTA 2019**

If you haven't already done so, please contact me to advise if you are able to assist on Saturday the 19<sup>th</sup> of October 2019. Due to a change in the way Scouting District events are run, those participating must register on line before Friday the 27<sup>th</sup> of September 2019. I will provide the registration details direct to those who have volunteered. Only those who register before the deadline will be able to attend the District Camp to assist with JOTA.

It is a requirement of the Scouting Association that all volunteers must have a Working With Children (WWC) check number. Anyone who does not already have a WWC number can easily obtain one online at www.kidsguardian.nsw.gov.au/child-safeorganisations/working-with-childrencheck For volunteers there is no cost. Simply complete the on line form and you will receive an email. Print out the email and take it the RMS NSW Government Service Centre (In Port Macquarie it is in the building in Central Road that was originally the Motor Registry) where you will have to show your Drivers Licence for identification. The counter staff will verify the identification and you will receive the WWC number shortly afterwards by email.

It the responsibility now organisations to verify WWC numbers prior to events. ORARC has to provide 1<sup>st</sup> Port Macquarie Sea Scouts a list of names, date of birth and WWC Check numbers from each person who is attending JOTA/ JOTI at McInherney Park. The Group Leader needs this list on Friday the 27th of September so it can be sent to the State Office for the checks to be completed prior to JOTA/JOTI. You will need the WWC number in order to complete the on line registration for the District Camp.

"The use of Spark sending apparatus and unrectified current is forbidden". "No period of sending shall exceed ten minutes. The time occupied in sending shall not exceed two hours during any consecutive period of twenty four hours". If power for working the wireless station is taken from public electricity supply there shall be no direct connection between supply and aerial" "The keying should be such that not key clicks shall be produced" (Quotations in "" taken verbatim from actual licence!).

I've attached a copy of the addendum for the use of modulation. Note (b): "I must not play the same gramophone record more than five times a day"

The WIA DX Awards Program (\*) Link is pleased to announce that the new award, the "Islands of Australia Award" is live and available today.

This new award recognises contacts with Amateur Radio stations on any of the 56 qualifying Islands of Australia.

The WIA Islands Of Australia Award is an award which compliments the RSGB/IOTA Ltd Program. The WIA wholeheartedly endorses this Program and hopes this award will encourage members to extend their "IOTA chasing" skills and achievements and apply for further RSGB/IOTA world-wide awards.

20 confirmed contacts qualify for the award. In addition, you will be able to download further copies of the award certificate with endorsement stickers for 25, 30, 35, 40, and 45 contacts. Once you reached 50 islands, your certificate will include an Honour Roll scroll and once you are able to make contact with all 56 Australian islands you will be able to download your copy of the award certificate with an Excellence endorsement scroll. The certificates are produced in real time by the online awards system and can be downloaded in PDF format and printed either at home, or at Office works for those who don't own a high quality colour printer.

The new award also features a Most Wanted list, which allows activators to target the rarest VK islands for their next DXpedition.

The award certificate features Coochiemudlo Island, part of OC-137, a small island in Moreton Bay, near Brisbane in VK4. The European explorer Matthew Flinders landed on Coochiemudlo Island on 19 July 1799, while he was searching for a river in the southern part of Moreton Bay. The name "Coochiemudlo" is an anglicised version of the Aboriginal Yuggera words kutchi (meaning red) and mudlo (meaning stone).

By participating in the online WIA DX Awards Program, you will have the opportunity to obtain your own personalised "Islands of Australia Award" certificate, or any one of the other 12 certificates and over endorsements.

I would like to acknowledge Marc Hillman VK3OHM and Robert Broomhead VK3DN for their efforts to make this award possible.

# **New 3.4GHz Digital Mode Record**

The record was set between Hayden VK7HH on Mt Wellington in Southern Tasmania and Peter VK7PD and Andre' VK7ZAB on Mt Barrow in Northern Tasmania over a distance of 168.7km.

The digital record was used the WSJT mode - FT8 and was set on the 2nd of September 2019.

# **Equipment from the Past**

Type 3 Mk. II (B2)

The equipment from the past for this month is a British WW-II clandestine radio called the Type 3 Mk. II, commonly known as the B2 Spy Set used in World War 2. The set was designed in 1942 by (then) Captain John Brown at SOE Station IX, and manufactured by the Radio Communication Department of the SOE at Stonebridge Park.





The set was issued to agents and resistance groups and special forces operating on occupied territory. The initial version came in an unobtrusive leather suitcase that allowed an agent to travel inconspicuously. This is the most well-known variant. Later in the war it was dropped by parachute in two water-tight containers that were more suitable for use by resistance groups operating in the field.

Some individuals were trained in England and dropped back into the Netherlands as secret agents to gather strategic information about the German occupation. It was too dangerous to transmit from a permanent spot. The Germans actively went after these illegal radios and whoever was caught, risked the death penalty. Secret messages, about for instance, weapons being dropped were passed via Morse code: a series of short and long beeps transmitted the text letter by letter. Originally these transmitters were hidden in an English brand of luggage. But because the Germans soon recognized these cases, members of the Resistance switched to carrying these spy radio sets in suitcases made in the Netherlands.

The Type 3 Mk.II (B2) was relatively small for its day and produced an HF output power of 20 Watts and had an estimated range of around 100 Km. Nevertheless, it was too big to carry around unobtrusively especially when travelling by public transport.

The Radio Society of Great Britain approached the Ministry of Supply at the end of the war to ask if radio amateurs could purchase these sets. The Ministry agreed to the purchase on condition of one set only per amateur and it was not to be resold by the amateur for a profit! These sets are desirable collectors items today and in good condition and even though they are nearly 80 years old may sell for many thousands of dollars.

# International Lighthouse and Lightship Weekend and the Remembrance Day Contest Report Henry VK2ZHE

This year the International Lighthouse and Lightship Weekend and the Remembrance Day Contest both took place over the same weekend, Saturday and Sunday the 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> of August 2014. The club's communications caravan was set up at the Tacking Point Lighthouse to operate VK2BOR continuously in both events for both days, including operating right through the Saturday night. The triple points after midnight in the RD contest were a great incentive!

In view of the extended 24 hour operation over the two days a decision was made to set the caravan up in the small parking area immediately to the north of the Lighthouse. This enabled a separate set of horizontal dipoles for 160, 40 and 20 metres to be erected to supplement the 5 band trap vertical HF antenna which is attached to the caravan. It is a testament to the strength of the caravan and its trap vertical HF antenna, and to the skill of the dipole erectors, that the installation survived the weekend unscathed despite the extreme wind and rain that Mother Nature inflicted on the site. Over 40 mm of rain fell and the wind blew from the north at over 20 knots throughout Saturday night. In the small hours of Sunday morning the intrepid midnight to dawn operators Paul Colledge VK2ICO and club president Lyle Smith VK2SMI feared for their safety as the caravan was buffeted by severe wind and rain squalls. Locating the caravan with a northerly aspect below the Lighthouse was a prudent decision. Had the caravan been located with a southerly aspect at the top of the Lighthouse turning circle the caravan would have been more exposed.

Thank you to Barry Gilson VK2LBG for towing the caravan to and from the Lighthouse and for so expertly maneuvering the caravan into position at the Lighthouse very early on the Saturday morning. Thank you to Lyle Smith VK2SMI who arrived on site

with his caravan equally early and to John Bailey VK2KHB, Des Thompson VK9FLHI, Bob Ecclestone VK1ZRE, Rob Frost VK2CRF, Henry Lundell VK2ZHE, Ray Mullins VK2JU. Mark *McGuire* VK2FMGM, Larry Lindsay VK2CLL, David Hogan VK2FRAB, Stuart Walsh VK2F-STU, Paul Colledge VK2ICQ, Bill Brooke VK2ZCW, Thomas Rae VK2ATR, Jim Neil VK2VIV John Hansen VK2AYQ and Craig Martin VK2ZCM who participated in the weekend.

The team of early morning starters on the Saturday morning made light work of the many tasks required in order to set up for the weekend. The erection of the HF dipoles was particularly challenging. The 160 metre dipole spanned all the way from the top of the very steep slope adjacent to the Lighthouse building to a location amongst the bushland on the high ground to the north of the parking area.

The Remembrance Day contest commenced at 1 pm local time. VK2BOR then actively participated in both events with paper logging of the Lighthouse contacts and computer logging of the RD contracts. The log keeper was always very busy! Again, there were plenty of stations on air and band conditions remained good although there were fewer contacts to be had this year on 20 metres and the higher bands than in some previous years. It was advantageous

to be able to quickly switch between the trap vertical and the horizontal dipoles to select the antenna giving the stronger signal.

Thank you again to everyone who participated in the VK2BOR operation over the two days to make it such a successful and enjoyable weekend despite the weather. VK2BOR made 48 contacts in the Lighthouse Weekend and scored a total of 315 points in the RD Contest . . . '
